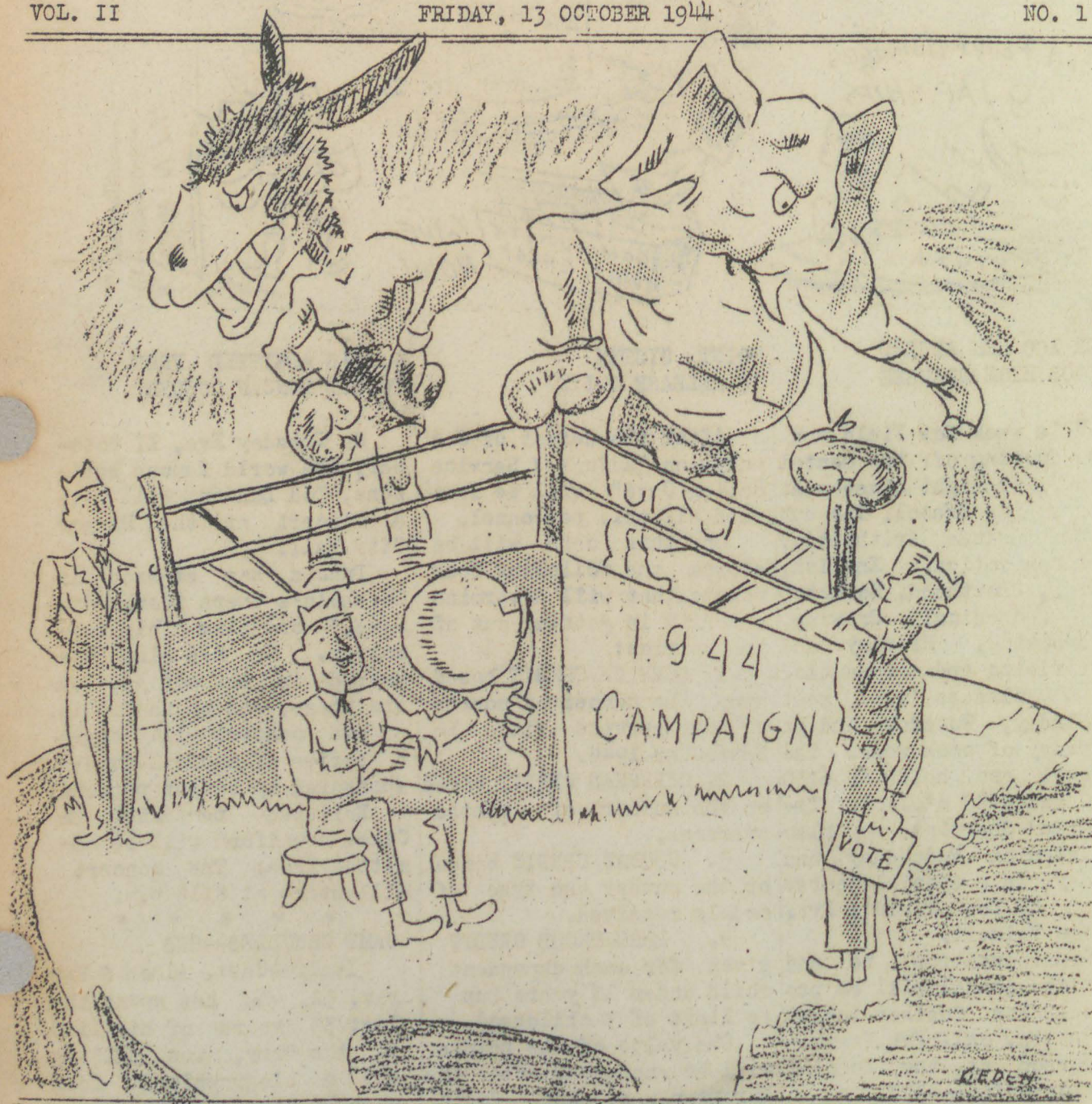

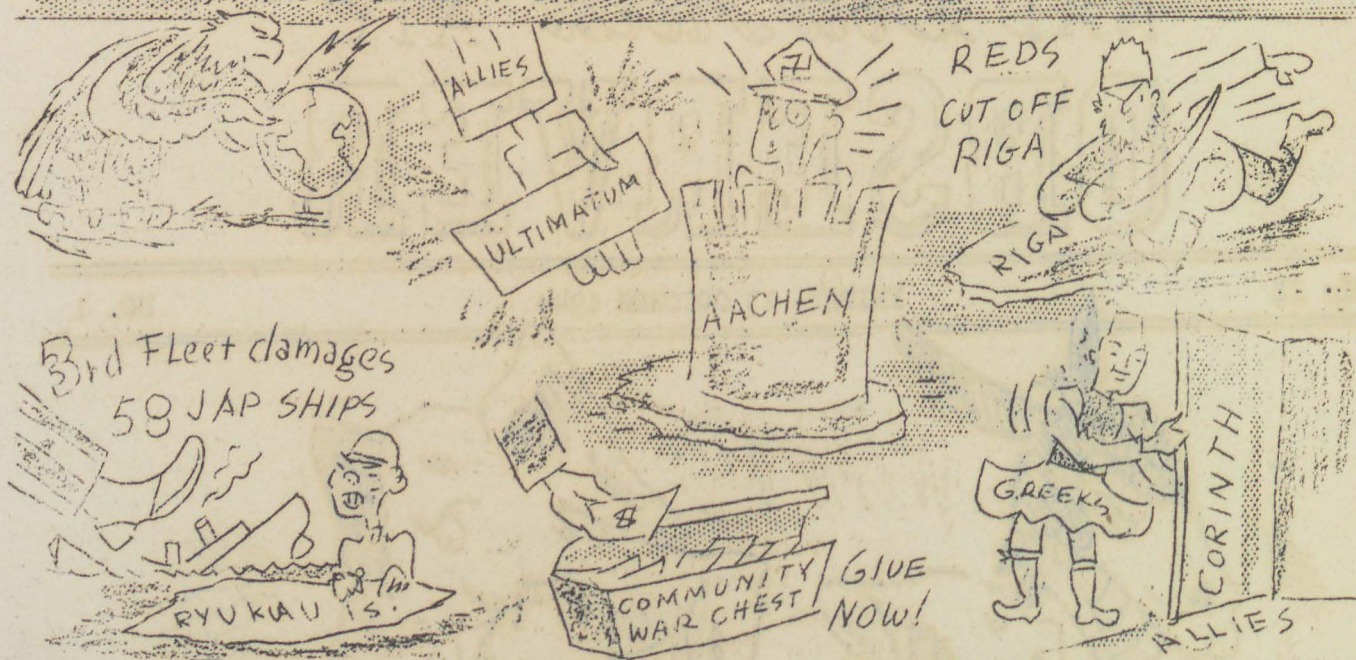

WAR CHEST

POINT SYSTEM
TO RELEASE G.I.'S

After the defeat of Germany, an "Adjusted Service Rating Card" will be issued all enl. personnel.

On this card will be scored the following four points that will determine priority in getting out of the service:

1. SERVICE CREDIT based upon the number of months of army service since 16 September 1944.

2. OVERSEAS CREDIT based on the number of months overseas.

3. COMBAT CREDIT based on the number and type of medals received.

4. PARENTHOOD CREDIT given for each dependent child under 18 years (up to limit of 3 children).

The value of the points will be announced after the European war. But don't get your hopes too high... just keep punching.

"Some of the letters that we receive would make Mr Anthony have problems," S/Sgt. Russell Swickard explained. "Take for instance this one....a woman calls up to locate a fellow named Jim.. that's all she knows about him just the

name Jim...nothing more, and she expects us to find him. In another case, a gal finds her boy friend has upped and married another girl. She wants him busted and tossed in the jug, about 4 months she figures would be right. And so it goes." Swick sighs, "everybody comes to us with their problems."

But it's not all such personal problems. Swick is by nature a methodical worker and his job as Sgt. Major is right up his alley. When the morning's mail comes in, he has to decide which letters go to the colonel and which go through other channels. By the same token, all letters going out from the base pass over his desk for a final check-up.

Swick's home town is steubenville, Ohil. After the usual schooling, he got his first job as cashier for the General Baking Co.



At the end of the first week, he sweated blood. His accounts were \$200 short. Frantically he checked and rechecked the figures. Still no go. Finally he located a check that had slipped behind the register. The 200 bucks was safe and sound.

For 5½ years he cashiered...then illness in the family forced him to try for more money. As salesman and contact man, he boosted his salary, thus solving his problem. After 6½ years, Uncle Sam looked him right in the eye.

After 12 days at the induction center (Fort Hayes) he spent 5 weeks at Jefferson Barracks. Here he was classified to go to Mass. Inst. of Technology to study topographical computations. He never did get there, though. The area had been taken over by the aviation cadets. He next found himself in the rugged aviation engineers. The regiment was formed in Richmond, Va. It came to Dow Field, but Swick took a detour. He tried for OCS at Fort Dix, but here again internal trouble jinxed the deal.

As a member of the 1906th, he came to Dow but later transferred to the main base. When he was appointed Sgt. Major he had three stripes. At present he ~~wears~~ the master stripes of Sgt. Major ~~but actually holds a staff rating.~~

A course in military law is being conducted daily in Bldg T-6 by Capt. John Osman for all the officers on the base.

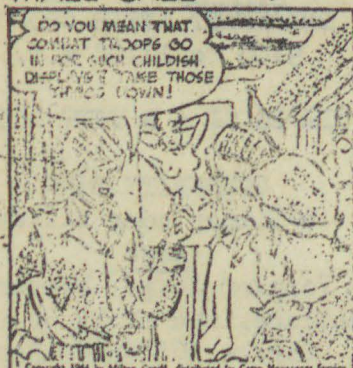

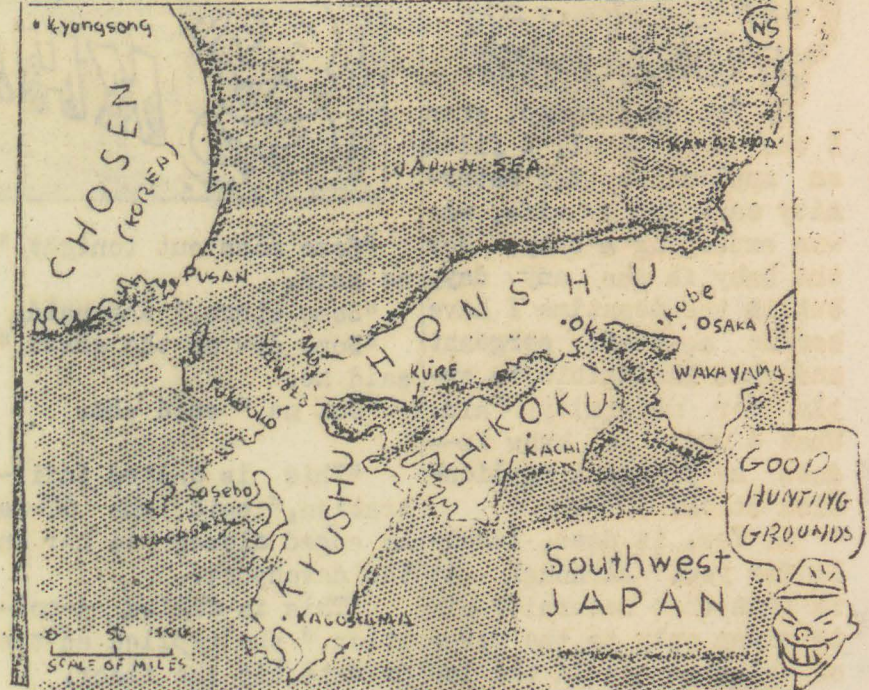
Knoxville, Tenn. (CNS)
