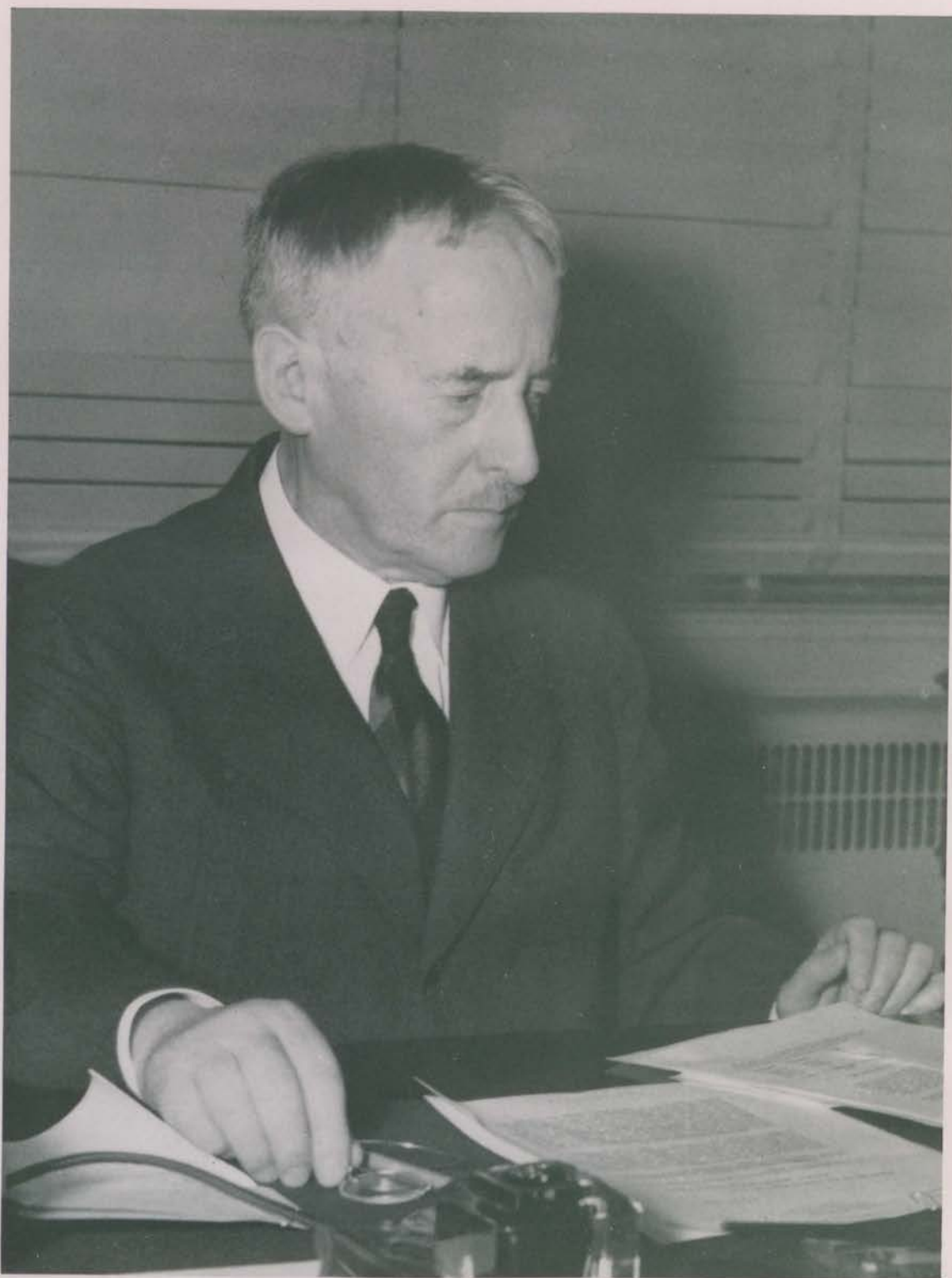

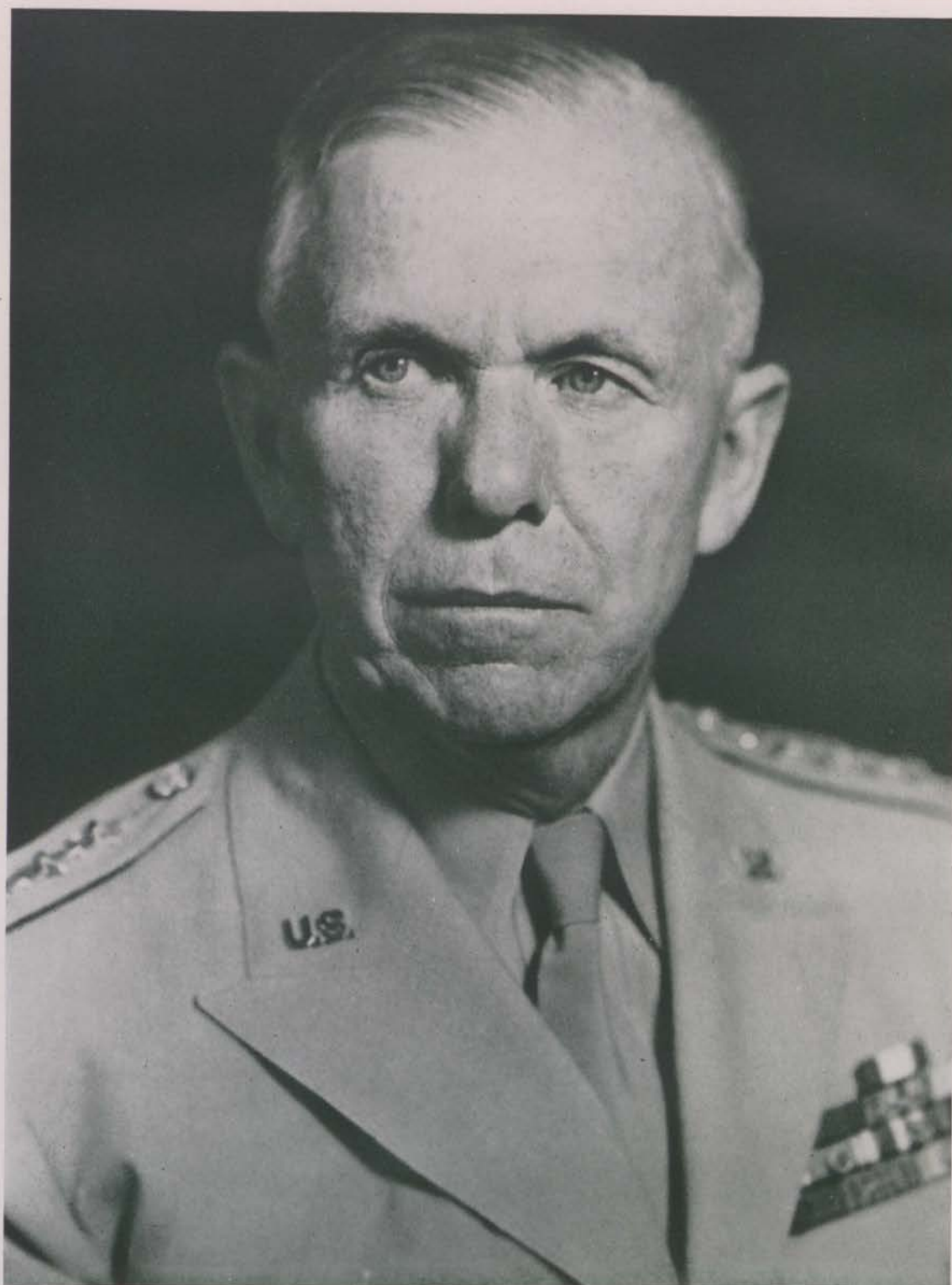

Our Army had grown until it numbered millions. Parents, wives and relatives had watched America's young men march off to distant training camps without being able to visit them and learn from personal observation how those men were being prepared for modern warfare. America was financing a war effort. It wanted to know how its money was being expended. The Bureau of Public Relations of the War Department wanted an answer. It was discovered in the Army War Show.

Major General Alexander D. Surles, Director of the Bureau of Public Relations, thought it would be wise if a cross section of the Army could be presented to the people of the country in the form of an Army War Show.

With the approval of the Chief of Staff, General George C. Marshall, he requested the cooperation of the Commanding Generals of the three components of the Army: Lieutenant General Henry H. Arnold of the Air Forces, Lieutenant General Lesley J. McNair of the Ground Forces, and Lieutenant General Brehon B. Somervell of the Service of Supplies. The task of organizing and planning fell to a public relations veteran, Major Charles Spencer Hart, who had managed war expositions during the last war.

With the full cooperation of all branches, a force of approximately 700 men was assembled at Fort George G. Meade, Maryland, on May 20, 1942. There were units from the Signal Corps at Fort Monmouth, Engineers from Fort Belvoir, Mechanized Cavalry from Fort Knox, Mechanized Infantry from Fort A. P. Hill, Chemical Warfare Service from Edgewood Arsenal, and a small but effective operating squadron from the Air Corps. A tank, anti-tank and several service units were added, and at Pittsburgh the task force was joined by a negro cavalry unit from the Ninth Cavalry of Fort Riley, Kansas.

This was to constitute the Provisional Task Force of the Army War Show. To Colonel Wilson T. Bals, General Staff Corps of the Seventh Service Command, came the man-sized assignment of organizing and of commanding the Task Force.

With the show moving from town to town, it was found wise to incorporate a national committee of prominent citizens to conduct it under their auspices; the net revenue to be turned over by this national corporation, War Shows, Inc., to the Army Emergency Relief Fund.

Mr. Stewart McDonald, former Federal Housing Administrator and chairman of the board of the Maryland Casualty Company, was persuaded to accept the presidency of the non-profit corporation. Mr. Henry Steeger, New York publisher and business man, was named vice-president. Mr. William P. Dunn, Vice-President of Manufacturers Trust Co., New York, was chosen treasurer, and Mr. John Reddy, Jr., was elected secretary and was retained as attorney for the corporation. Mr. Dunn and Mr. Reddy held identical positions with Ringling Brothers-Barnum & Bailey Circus for many years, and their services to the War Show were invaluable.

ARMY WAR SHOW

A governmental operated organization requires complete financial records. As assistant treasurer, Mr. Don Campbell and his assistant, Mr. Robert Cramond, traveled with the War Show, mastering the task of organizing a comprehensive system of finance, bookkeeping and purchasing records.

A National Advisory Committee consisting of 48 of the most prominent and professional men of the United States aided the working organization. Likewise, in each city visited a local committee of prominent citizens helped pave the way for the engagement. The cooperation from the press, radio, outdoor advertising plants, merchants, and industries was enthusiastic and whole-hearted. Newspapers devoted editorial, cartoon, and advertising space to the Show; radio stations gave unlimited air time for broadcasting, and choice billboards and advertising sites were donated in every city.

Throughout, the cooperation was magnificent within the organization, and the national acclaim received by the Army War Show stands as a lasting tribute to the Bureau of Public Relations, the Task Force, War Shows, Inc., and Army Emergency Relief, and to Colonel Bals and Major Hart for their untiring efforts toward a greater and still greater Show.

Officers, enlisted men, and civilians whose loyal effort built the Army War Show will be compensated many times over for their presentation of an inspiring spectacle which has made our citizens more cognizant of the increased effort and sacrifice needed at this time. For years to come they will be able to hear the ringing cheers of many millions of appreciative Americans, cheers for them and the Army War Show.

An itinerary of eighteen key American cities was arranged, to be completed December 21. By that time approximately 4,000,000 persons will have seen the Army War Show and the net revenue derived for the benefit of Army Emergency Relief will amount to over a million dollars.

In the organization and presentation of this Task Force to the nation, Major Hart saw the need for professional exposition and production experts from civilian life to stage the Show efficiently. With this objective in mind, he called together the finest specialists in the field and every one of these experts accepted the assignments with enthusiasm. None received more than a Colonel's salary. That policy was adhered to throughout.

Mr. Frank Duffield, widely-known director of outdoor shows, accepted the post of Producing Director. Aiding him was his son, Mr. John Duffield. Mr. Joseph M. Upchurch, prominently associated with the direction of the New York World's Fair during its second year, was made General Manager. Mr. Blevins Davis, of the National Broadcasting Company, and Mr. Meredith Page, worked with Mr. Duffield and Major Hart for weeks to produce a scenario which has been altered little during the War Show's six-month tour. Mr. Harry P. Harrison, director of ticket sales for both recent World's Fairs, organized a staff that handled the colossal task of selling three or four million tickets in 18

cities. Mr. Richard Flood and Mr. Thomas J. Deegan were called to Baltimore as Executive Manager and Director of Press Relations respectively.

These men were ably assisted by Mr. John W. Judd, in charge of the Battle Depot Exhibit; Lieut. Joseph D. Ryle, Mr. Grover McDonald and Mr. F. D. McDonald, Administrators; Mr. Lloyd Maxwell, as Advertising Promotion Director; Captain Ray Thompson and Mr. Robert Cutler in state-wide publicity, and Sgts. Bob Waldrop and Bert Parks as official commentators on the Show, whose work met with highest approval. Mr. George Smith, for many years associated with Ringling Brothers-Barnum & Bailey Circus, worked with the Task Force transportation officers to perfect the quick and efficient movement of the production between cities. Mr. Lester Worden and Mr. Gabriel Bundschuh, Assistant Stadium Managers; Mr. Dick Hopkins, Stadium Ticket Sales; and Mr. W. G. McDonald, Ticket Auditor, were valuable assets to the Army War Show.

An elaborate lighting system was necessary for the desired dramatic effects. Mr. Leon Leonidoff, Director of Radio City Music Hall in New York, volunteered his services, as did Professor Stanley McCandless, of the Department of Drama of Yale University. With the cooperation of Lieut. Richard F. Gretsche, Electrical Engineer, Mr. J. W. Collins, Chief Electrician, and Mr. George Holtrey, Electrical Construction, the problems of lighting the Army War Show were solved.

This entire group of experts in their various fields went to work without fanfare, and the resulting Army War Show developed into the largest enterprise of its kind ever attempted in this country.

Early in November, by order of the War Department, the operation of the Army War Show was placed under the direction of Major General Irving J. Phillipson, Executive Director of Army Emergency Relief.

Credit for the outstanding success of this huge spectacle is accorded Colonel Wilson T. Bals, commanding officer of the Army War Show Provisional Task Force. Colonel Bals was attached to Seventh Corps Area Headquarters, Omaha, Nebraska, when he received the War Show assignment. He reported immediately to Fort George Meade, Maryland, where the Task Force units were assembled for rehearsal.

Less than three weeks were available for rehearsing for the opening performance. With the assistance of a hurriedly chosen staff, Colonel Bals quickly whipped the units into shape, disposing of obstacles and problems with dispatch and precision.

The Army War Show gave to the spectators a picture of their Army in action, equipped with the latest war weapons and accoutrements. Never before had they had the privilege of viewing the intricate maneuvers and manipulations of the Army of the United States, together with the latest types of guns and equipment. The result was overflow crowds in virtually every city on the war show's itinerary.

In addition to the splendid leadership of Colonel Bals, tribute must be paid to the 2,300 men and officers who comprised the War Show task force. They took their duties to their hearts from the start, plunging into the job with the same enthusiasm as their fellow soldiers assigned to combat duty.

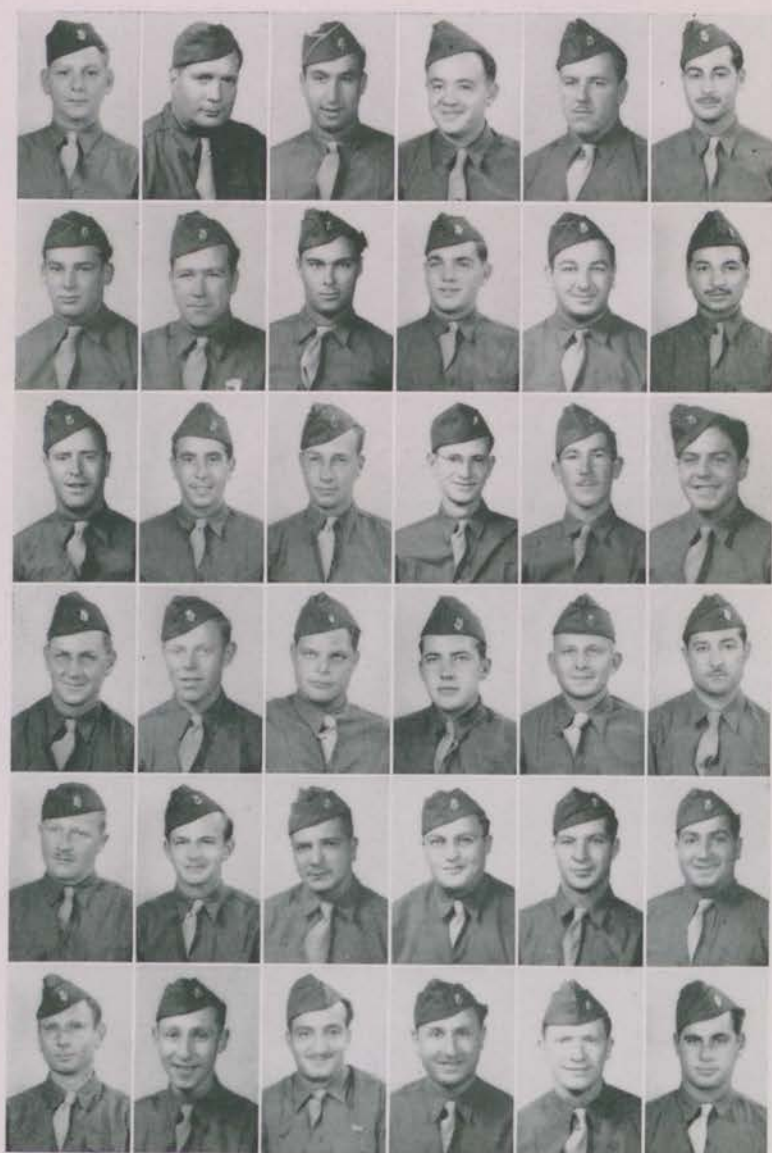

The Tank Destroyers . . . Here is the Army's latest and most effective weapon against tanks. Mounting a 75mm gun forward above the driver, a gun capable of firing seven to nine miles. The Tank Destroyer is a useful weapon in many ways, though it appears at its best firing point blank and close range at any mechanized vehicle. No tank in existence can withstand close range from these destroyers. . . . On level terrain, they are capable of a speed of 50-55 miles per hour, thus on the level outrunning tanks. They depend upon reconnaissance to locate enemy tanks, so that they can get in there and fire.

The Destroyers weigh 11 tons, carrying half a ton of ammunition, including antiaircraft, heavy and light machine guns and grenades. They carry three-quarter-inch army plate except in the front and in the closures, which is one-half-inch or better armament. They appear most menacing when they are "buttoned-up."

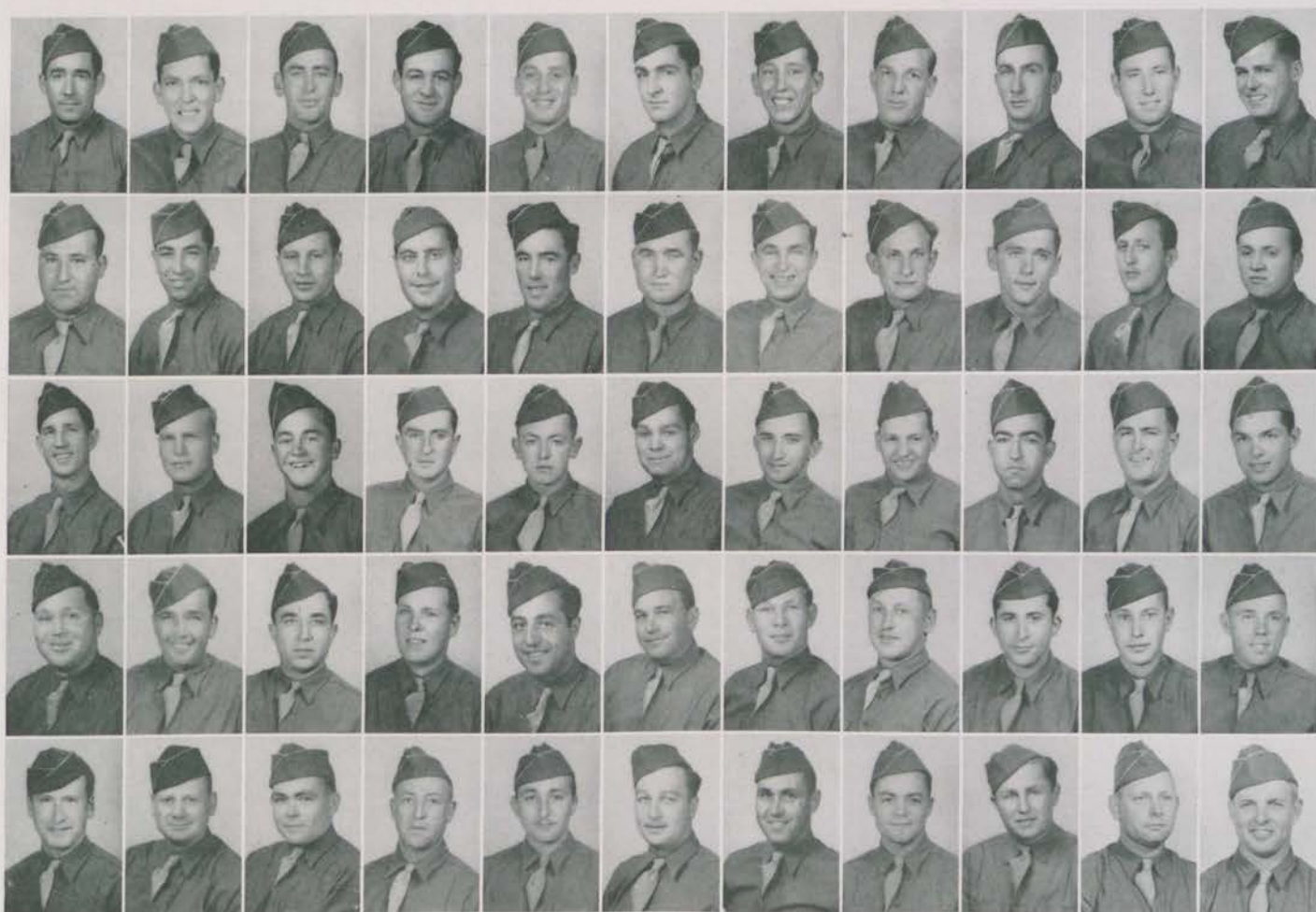

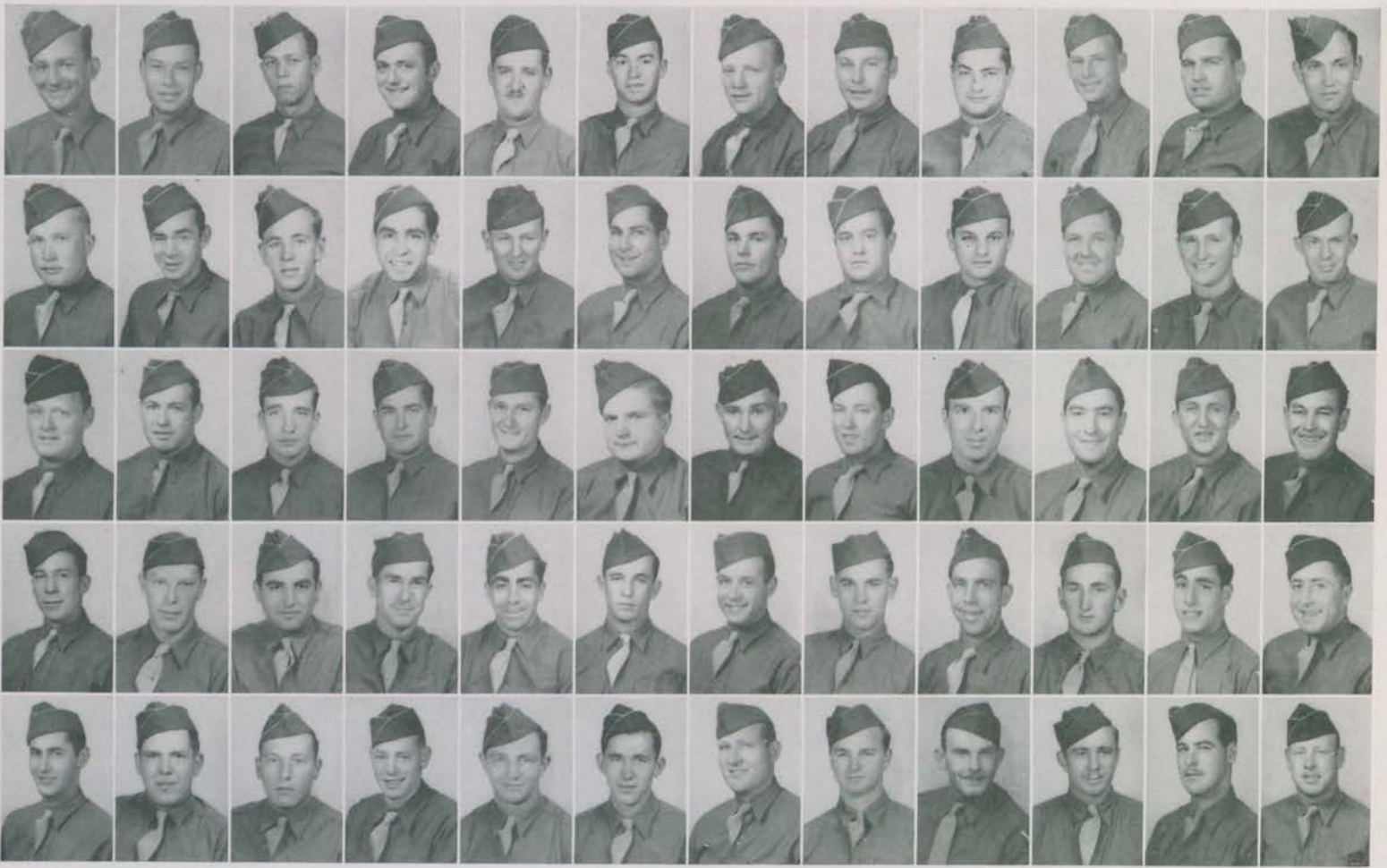

Battle Depot

The Army War Show's Battle Depot grew out of the realization that, although the presentation of "Here's Your Army" gave the folks back home a chance to see their Army in action, it did not permit them to become intimate with the men and their weapons. Thus, as the Show would move into a stadium, six giant circus tents would mushroom into view in a nearby lot. Within the tented walls were the exhibits of nine separate branches of the Army: Quartermaster Corps, Signal Corps, Air Forces, Chaplain Corps, Army Nurse Corps, Corps of Engineers, Medical Corps, Chemical Warfare Service, and Ordnance Department.

Each branch displayed the weapons and material it uses in actual combat, with trained soldiers delivering short talks explaining their operation. Questions from visitors were plentiful and few went unanswered. In many cases, civilians were permitted to operate the weapons on display. And in this manner the fury and thunder of the Army War Show became real and understandable. Likewise, through contacting the Exhibit Area soldiers personally, they found the American soldier well trained and ready to explain clearly the job of operating his particular weapon.

By the time the Army War Show had reached St. Louis, thirteenth city on the tour, the Battle Depot had been visited by nearly 700,000 Americans. More than 49,000 persons saw the Battle Depot on its record day during the Chicago engagement. That engagement alone provided 212,000 admissions in eleven days.

The Battle Depot had two officers in charge during the tour, Lt. Col. John A. Lunsford being in charge until the Milwaukee engagement, when he was relieved to become Executive Officer for the Task Force. His successor for the remainder of the tour was Major Eugene W. Rideout. John W. Judd was manager of the area throughout the tour, representing War Shows, Inc.

Following the Cleveland engagement, the Battle Depot went on a brief foray of its own to Connellsville, Pa. Without the aid of its senior partner, the Depot found the smaller city more than enthusiastic . . . 23,000 attending in three days, accounting for almost the entire population of the immediate area.

The Battle Depot proved to be a worthy partner for the Army War Show, a credit to the soldiers who manned it, and it brought a true picture of the American soldier and his weapons to the people back home.

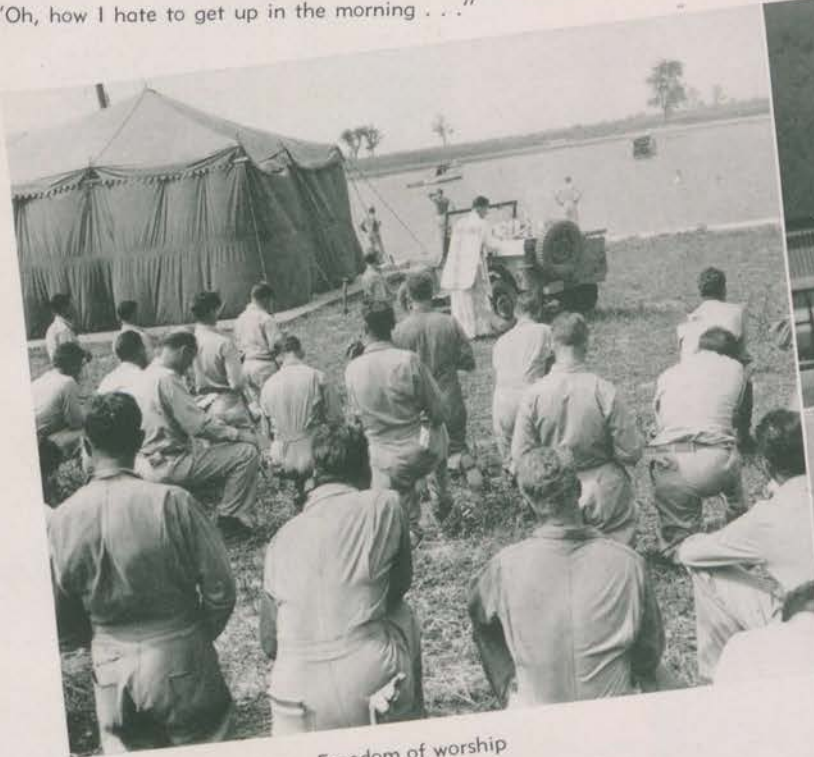

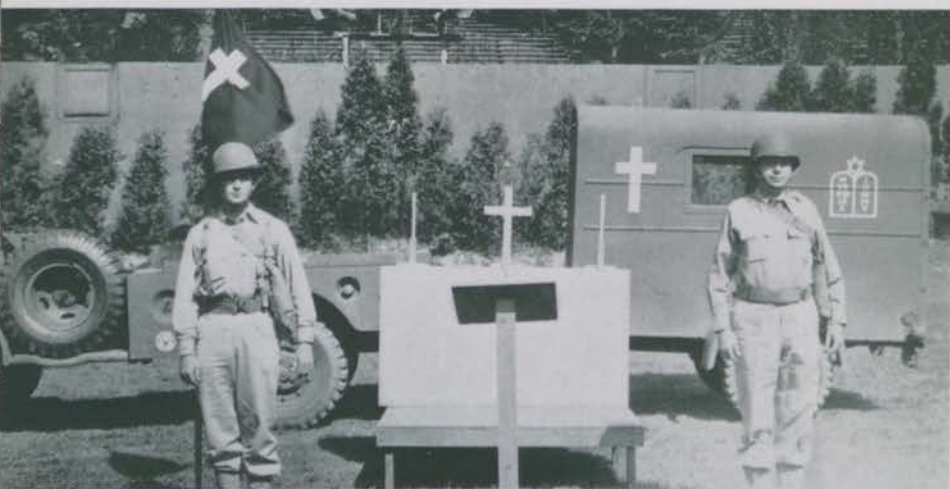
CHAPLAIN'S CORPS

Radio Activity



It was obvious from the start that since it was desirable to get the message of the Army War Show to as many people as possible, radio should play its rightful part. So, two Army men, Sgt. Bert Parks and Sgt. Bob Waldrop, experienced in radio broadcasting through their close contact with the industry over a long period of years, were sent out in advance to interest the various radio stations in devoting air time to the Army War Show.

A group of program ideas was devised which could be adapted to almost any station's requirements, using the personnel and officers of the Show itself as the main participants. Also, through the medium of "on the spot" broadcasting, Sgts. Parks and Waldrop endeavored to dramatize the use of Army equipment. At the Battle Depot visitors were interviewed as they examined army exhibits. In important areas in the business district intensely interesting interviews were conducted with civilians who inspected the mechanized equipment used in the Army War Show.

Another promotional device that was used with great success was the "welcoming ceremony." Three platoons of Infantry, a Horse Cavalry detachment, and the Army War Show Band would come downtown, preferably in front of City Hall, as a guard of honor for Colonel Bals, the mayor, and other civic leaders. Here the mayor would officially welcome the Army War Show to the respective city, with the ceremonies being broadcast over a local hook-up of two or more stations.

Since the Army War Show was making a nation-wide tour it was necessary to get national coverage to herald the coming of the spectacle to cities not yet visited. Two network broadcasts were arranged, Mutual carrying a half-hour program from Butler Stadium in Indianapolis, and CBS originating a 15-minute network program from the scene of the War Show in St. Louis. In addition to arranging these programs, Sgts. Parks and Waldrop themselves told the message of the War Show on other network programs in Chicago, Cleveland and New York, to be heard throughout the nation.

Up to the time of the Dallas engagement, 285 programs had been broadcast advertising the Army War Show. This stands as a great tribute to the radio stations of the United States. In order to give such an abundance of free time, regular broadcast schedules had to be revised drastically. Also, there was the problem of remote pick-ups, entailing the installation of telephone lines, which is not an easy job in these days of priorities. Where it was impractical to install lines, the event was recorded and played later on the station.

The radio industry responded magnificently to the requests made by the members of the War Show's radio staff. In addition to all of their other broadcast activities, the stations filled their schedule with spot announcements telling the facts about the production. More than 86 radio stations cooperated with the War Department by broadcasting War Show programs.

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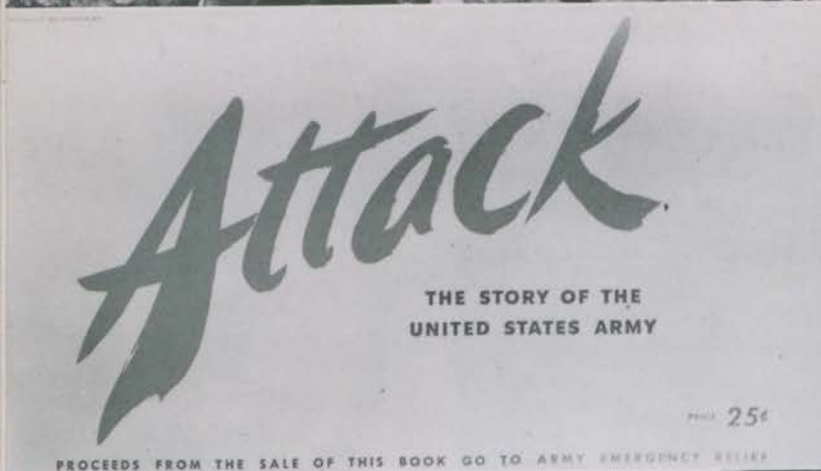
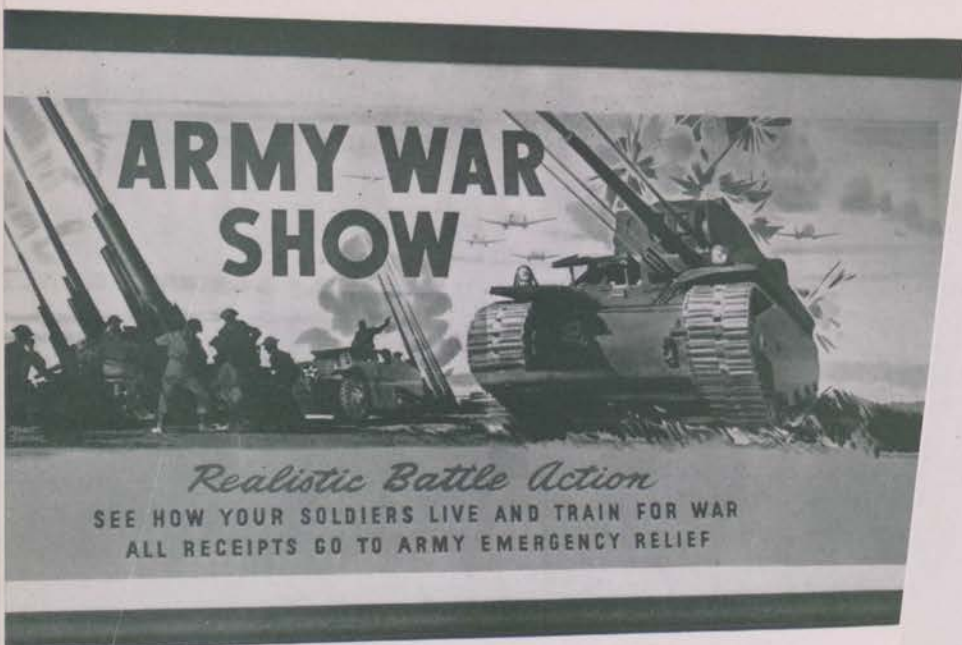
