FOREWORD

PERHAPS the ejaculation best remembered by the 1942-1943 *Oracle* Staff will be: "But this is war!"

Despite limitations, priorities, and cuts, the board has managed to put out consistently improved issues. Evermindful of its obligation as representative and biographer of the School, the *Oracle* has tried to mirror back the students to themselves and to record faithfully their activities. Increasingly favorable comments from the National Scholastic Press Association and from other sources have encouraged the efforts of the staff.

An original assembly play was a lively lead for the fall subscription campaign which was highly successful in spite of decreased enrollment.

That this is war has been especially evident in the shifted schedule, the shortened meetings, the doubled duties of the staff members. Students with the will and ability to produce ideas and material for the *Oracle* simply have not had the time. Or when there has been time and talent, they have not been utilized because of wartime restrictions on printers' and engravers' equipment. Now when so many school organizations are closing shop until the war is ended, the *Oracle* cannot, must not be classed among those for whom it is better to lie dormant for the duration. Vital for its historical value as well as its literary, this student magazine should be the last to be sacrificed. The school in war can be preserved for succeeding Bangor High students no more permanently than in these pages. And when war clouds and government priorities have lifted, the *Oracle* will begin to realize its many possibilities: photographic covers; a consistent, *Oracle*-style type of column head; — "bleeding off" fashion pictures and others. These and more the *Oracle* so wanted to see in actuality this year. But it would seem that this pleasure was not for 1943, but the happy prospect of some future year.

As the *Oracle* launches into its second half-century, it wishes to express appreciation to its advertisers for their continued support in spite of wartime budgets; to Mr. Frederick Pinkham and the typing classes; to the good will and the good work of Jordan-Frost printers, and to the many teachers and students who have shown ready and able cooperation during this first full year of World War II.

The student assembly committee consisting of John Ballou, president of Council, Prudence Speirs, and Robert Saltzman decided to give honor to pupils who for four years have consistently maintained a high scholastic standing in all major subjects. This gesture of recognition by the Student Council is an indication that the students themselves appreciate scholarship and wish to pay some special tribute to this most important phase of their academic life.

Honors at graduation and membership in the National Honor Society already provide one type of scholarship recognition, but attainment of either of these honors does not necessarily imply the degree of consistency in achievement required for a Scholarship Recognition Certificate. The recipient of honor rank at graduation is a pupil who has achieved a four year average of 85 or better in all major subjects; he may or may not have earned honor rank in each subject every semester. The recipient of membership in National Honor Society is a pupil standing in the upper third of his class who also excels in character, leadership, and service; he may or may not have earned honor rank in each subject every semester. The recipient of a Scholarship Recognition Certificate is a pupil who has succeeded in scholastic achievement by maintaining a rank of 85 or better in every subject, each semester for seven semesters. Thus a Scholarship Recognition Certificate may be said to be a tribute to consistency in academic achievement. Pupils receiving these certificates are known as Bangor High School Scholars.

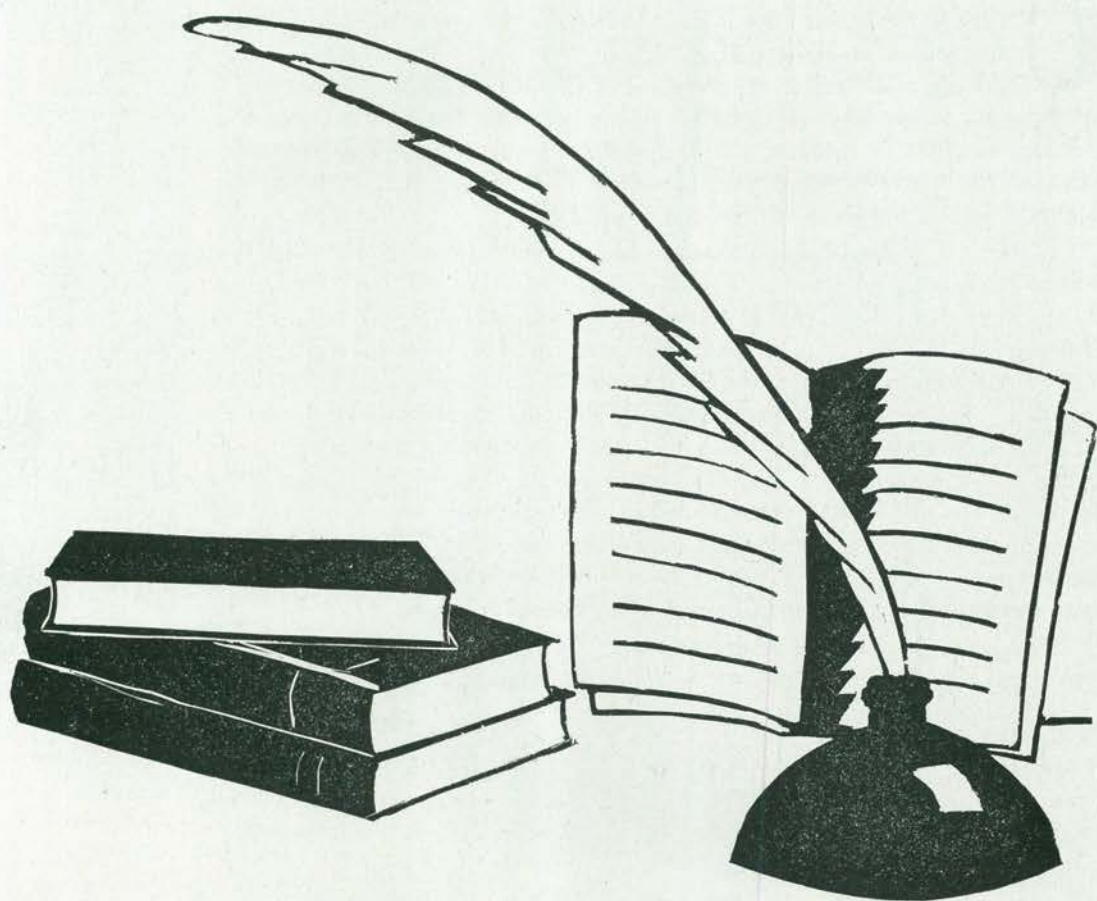

Woman Emergent

ALICE Duer Miller asks with a suggestion of irony, "Are women people?" The time approaches when the world will fully affirm that they are . . . when the world will declare with Lucretia Mott that women have the inherent right to vote. . . . when the world will perceive with Mary Lyon that the mind of woman differs in no essential from that of man, or as Madame Chiang Kai-shek replied upon being asked her opinion on the Equal Rights Amendment, "Brains have no sex." There is, however, still much time before that truth has universal acceptance.

Woman emergent is a reality that calls for adjustment. It is also a change that has been amazingly advanced by war. Trite but truer than ever in 1943, "a woman's work is never done." War has necessitated that she maintain two fronts—that she function conscientiously in the home and that she supplement manpower in countless callings. That women can defend their country and do, is being evidenced every day. The splendid wartime performance of women a generation ago was powerful argument for suffrage, for they quietly and efficiently shouldered responsibilities on a par with those of men in the time of peace. Thus World War I accelerated the woman movement. How great a force will World War II bring to bear on the woman emergent? How far will this war for survival carry her towards the fulfillment of her dearest, most daring dreams—the visions of the courageous women leaders about whom spoke China's first lady: "They fought for recognition that each sex had a distinctive contribution to make to public affairs and society and that failure to accept the logic of women's altered status was an effort to 'put the bird back into the egg.'"

The woman of tomorrow will be the woman in politics—politics in its finest connotation. She will be a woman of strength, vision, and courage, the woman emergent of World War II. And her inspiring prototype will be one of the three greatest women of China—Soong Mayling.

The Missimo's childhood was not marked by material wealth; but her mother taught her the need and power of prayer, and her father gave her the American education that was a part of his dream of freeing China. In the last seven years Mayling has suffered much, for she loves and lives China. And she has been grateful for the stability which having more than a "bowing acquaintance" with God has established in her life.

Wellesley's first alumna returned in March to the scene of her days as a student. Student-like, she still seeks the truth in all matters, firm in the faith that it does exist. On campus she addressed the woman of tomorrow in naming the college as the reservoir from which women will renew strength to work for a saner world of peace and fellowship. Wellesley's watchword, "Not to be ministered unto but to minister," has been her guide-line; from it she explained the three fundamentals she has learned: cooperation, the spirit of humility, and probity in thought and in action.

Unfailing at the Generalissimo's side, Mayling lends her strength to China's Strong Man. As "husband helper," she finds an outlet for the exuberance of energy and intelligence that sometimes made her appear impatient and unconventional. Or is it the impressionable period in America that gave her this restlessness? From her school days she has "kept up an awful thinking about everything."

Madame Chiang is the New Life Movement—a spiritual reform for China and a pet project for the Chiangs. With the coming of war, the program proved more than "a code of petty rules for behavior." It enabled the Madame to concentrate quickly on the organization of Chinese women. The efforts of women leaders she directed to the education of the masses, which she held to be as important to defense as hospitals and munitions factories. Workable plans she evolved for the training of teachers and for the evacuation of war workers and war orphans. The miracle of her personality has made Chinese women be

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The World on Wings

"**P**AN Asiatic Express Company? This is Burnett of General Motors. Have you shipping space for forty-three automobiles aboard the next aerial train bound for Honolulu? You have? We'll send them down at once. And would you please drop off four of the trucks at San Francisco on your way over?"

A dream? Perhaps. Today, yes; tomorrow, a reality. When the world crawls from beneath the debris left in the wake of man's greatest fight for freedom, it will turn to the air. Even while the smoke of battle yet hangs low, planes will be the speediest transportation for vitally needed relief materials and food for a starving world.

Huge multi-engined planes will tow dozens of freight gliders along the air-roads of tomorrow; each glider detaching itself from the tow plane at a designated spot and gliding to earth with its load of freight.

A vast world wide net work of air lines, carrying tons of materials to the remotest places, will give opportunity for employment to thousands of young men. Planes used as moving vans will come into being; planes will carry tourists to every continent and country; planes will replace buses in long distance travels; planes, planes, planes, and more planes, an endless line of planes to transform the living conditions of tomorrow's civilization.

Such a great dream cannot be realized unless the countries of the world give up their selfish ideas of "sovereignty of the air;" a statement that each country has complete control of the air above lands and territories. This means that planes have not the right of free flight over foreign territory. Monarchies and Democracies alike refuse to have the planes of traditional enemies flying over their land to spy on their secret fortifications and industrial

areas. Should such selfish and jealous aims be tolerated? Should one country have the legal right to prevent other countries from viewing its means of destruction?

In the aftermath of war the foreign policies of nations should be more outspoken than the secret and selfish policies of the past. Some means of determining the truth of diplomatic intercourse should be arranged by the "World Court" which is a must of post-war organization.

The more personal "wings" of the future will be the family plane. The helicopter will be widely used for this purpose. Of course, for many years, these will be found only in homes of wealth or be used by wealthy tourists.

The United States will have the largest air fleet in the world. America's great industries will turn out thousands of planes to travel over every portion of the globe, spreading the ideals of Democracy and of Christianity to backward peoples of the earth.

The high expense of air transportation will doubtless continue for many years, but some day will decrease to fit the income of the common man. Naturally, the automobile will not be replaced, for city travel would hardly be practical in a plane travelling from seventy five to four hundred miles per hour. It will take many years of research in aerodynamics and synthetic fuels to bring the airplane to full power, but its day will come.

As to travel to outer space—probably impossible. But sudden discoveries and steady improvement in atom smashing, active rays, and other engineering marvels may some day, in a far future, send rocket ships speeding to Mars, Venus or the Moon.

Certainly aircraft have a great future and it seems likely that the world will some day be a "world on wings."

Others have lived for days, waiting on the open sea, and praying to a God they'd sometimes doubted before; still others have felt the hot, unfriendly desert sun on their tired bodies. They've seen it all; they're not going to repeat our old mistakes. We'll need to build; they'll have the tools.

No one knows how long the war will last. We're all strategists, but no one knows. The boys are fighting, but they're also planning. Their first aim is to win the peace, their next to insure its safety for all peoples. Once before, we thought we'd done with wars, casualty lists, famine, telegrams beginning "We regret to inform you—", and lines of hungry, desolate people. Johnnie won't forget this. When the boys dictate the peace terms, they'll remember martyrs; they'll remember the peace-makers; they'll remember documents. People like Jefferson, Lincoln, Ghandi, Chiang-Kai-Chek, Confucius, Roosevelt, and Churchill will stick in their minds.

Planes of the Future

ACROSS the world a shadow lengthens, darkening as it grows. What can it be? Is a long night ahead or has man come to the end of his race? He will have what Hitler thought he had in his army and his tanks and his tiny planes of 1940. The owner of this titan might attack any city on earth without ever being seen or heard by spotters on the ground. And his attack would be effective simply because he could release so many bombs that aiming would be needless. Whole cities could be destroyed by a small squadron of ten of these titans and in a very few minutes they could work this destruction.

What about the cost? Certainly they could much cheaper than our \$100,000,000 battleships and what good are these battleships unless they are protected by a carrier and its planes.

Is all this fantastic? Well, just about as much so as those little crates of wood and can-

vas that were the object of so much amusement back around 1910. Today a few of the Washington brass hats may laugh at the idea of 1,000 ton air transports, but the aviation leaders know it's just a question of time and the ready cash to attempt the job. With the war and all, we're pretty busy so Titan must wait.

But not so very far off the great giant awaits its hour. Who will own it? Who will fly it? Will some Japanese pilot steer it for California? Will some Russian genius head it for Tokyo? Or will some Yankee flyer take a friendly run to South America? Whoever is the master of the Titan will rule the World. Before anybody can build a rival ship, he can wipe out his enemy as easily as man slaps down a mosquito.

When the mighty Terror strikes, will we have done too little-too late or can we arouse ourselves to the possibility of such a thing? It might not appear for ten or fifteen years, yet somebody could be working on one away back in Central Asia or a lost mountain valley in India or Africa. Did Hitler know Stalin was building all those tanks and planes that stopped the confident German army? He thought the Russians and their equipment would be a push-over. Shrewd leaders can hide their secret.

For as surely as day turns to night, these Titans and small fliver planes are on the way. When they arrive, no one can say. This makes all the more urgent our prompt action in preparation. We must take the first opportunity for designing, testing and building these great 1,000 ton giants and little three passenger flivers. For if we don't create the overwhelming air force first, somebody else will. And that somebody may prefer to use it to destroy us!

Men of Tomorrow

FOR twelve years this spinning earth has carried a burden of war. In most of these years it has carried the burden of depression as well. Millions upon millions of young people have grown up in a world where two great words were depression and war.

Some time in these bitter years—some time in the past few months—the world has changed. It is becoming a world anticipating and planning for peace. A generation haunted by depression and war has begun to plan for a future where both will be impossible. In every country the masses of plain people have their own plans for what they want to do after the victory is won. Some of them are reading books and articles. Most of them are talking about the postwar world in their own language. They are the world's two billion people and their hopes and their works outweigh the promises of leaders and all the plans of the planners.

In India the common people long held down by the bonds of ignorance and superstition, are coming into contact with western ideas of freedom and democracy. Indian nationalists, educated abroad, have returned to lead the movement for Indian independence. This movement with Gandhi and Nehru its outstanding leaders has assumed such tremendous importance that England has been forced to imprison its leaders and resort to violence to keep down the seething discontent. But the march of India toward freedom has begun. Force won't prevail against it. The world is too small for one section to remain backward. As Willkie hints in the title of his book "One World" all the world is moving ahead.

China, our ally, has been fighting for years. In the course of the conflict, the Chinese peoples have learned the value of cooperation and education. The heroism of Chinese students is a saga of unparallel determination. Schools have been transported thousands of miles across the great Chinese lands from the bombed coastal cities to the comparatively safe mountainous country where schools have been set up using caves as classrooms.

The Japanese bombing of their coastal cities has forced a decentralization of their war effort.

Cooperative endeavor thruout China has been the main source of munitions with which to continue her struggle with Japan. When the war ends, China has seen to it that she will have young, alert, educated leaders; her people have learned the lesson of working together; China will emerge from this war a great progressive democracy.

In Europe the people have been ground under the iron heel of Nazism. But they have never given in completely to the Nazi yoke. In every hamlet, town and city there has been organized resistance. This resistance has resulted because the people feel that they can achieve something better. The Four Freedoms and the Atlantic Charter signed by all the United Nations have given expression to that for which the people of Europe are willing to die in an attempt to gain happiness and security for themselves and their children. It is the belief in a better world as well as a revolt against the present state of affairs which prompts them to derail trains, blow up bridges, sabotage war industries and murder German soldiers.

We Americans as co-signers of the Atlantic Charter and the outstanding example of the democratic idea of government "of the people, by the people and for the people" have by our example and our promise pledged ourselves to the creation of a better world in which we recognize our fate as being linked, by means of the airplane and other rapid means of transportation and communication, to the future of the rest of the world.

The man of the future will live in a smaller world where the actions of the Indians, Russians or Africans will affect him as much as the activities of his own government in Washington. He must make an attempt to understand the peculiar social customs of the other sections of this cramped world. If he fails to realize his common heritage with worldwide humanity, this war will have been fought in vain; the world's peace will be sabotaged, and the man of the future will see his children of the future again march off to war.

My automobile experience needs little comment as you well know. Working a year in the Retail Shoe Business under Mr. Claude Lovely's supervision has shown me another field entirely unrelated to the mechanical world, but certainly a place where the value of training and experience is quickly brought to light.

You see, Mother, the years in the mechanical and business worlds that I have enjoyed have set me far ahead of the average young man, and I know that the lessons of business experience will be valuable to me in the Army, and later, as I start to build my future and permanent economic life.

Actually thousands of new inventions will be available for developments—plastics, aviation, chemistry, air conditioning, new metals and new uses, new automobiles and new helicopters, and this brief letter can mention but a very few.

Therefore Mother, I have a place to make in a great new world. . . a place that can be the size that I have the fortitude to make it. What more can I ask then the start you have given me. . . love, faith, and strength, and the advantages of good schooling and good guidance of fine teachers and friends. So the future, after the war, seems bright to me, because it offers so much, and because I feel that I have been equipped by good fortune and good parents to meet the years ahead with a spirit of confidence.

So Mom, the future has more opportunities ahead than you may realize or hope for, and I intend to take advantage of them.

What of the Home ?

HERE is no question that women's place in the Post War World will be entirely changed. No longer will she be considered the weaker or lesser sex. This Post War Period will see the pronoun "she" synonymous with "he." The famous toast of Henry W. Wallace, Vice-President of the United States, on his good-will tour of the South American countries, "Not above you; not beneath you; but with you," aptly describes the situation. This parallel interest in business, social and industrial life embracing politics, community service, Civilian Defense projects, etc. will have a very material effect upon the home as we now understand it. The situation is fraught with great dangers, and must be controlled or the home, which is the basis of every valued civilization, will be seriously weakened.

The successful prosecution of the war is now the primary consideration of every man, woman, and child of the United States. Naturally women have to be used, not only in the armed forces, but in every other activity of life, as the best of our manpower is necessary to build an effective, powerful, combatant army. This present emphasis is naturally changing the focus from the essential things in normal life, one of which is the home. This is all very well and is as it should be now. However, the great danger is whether it will bring back these essentials into proper focus when the war effort no longer demands the primary thought of every citizen, and our thoughts again revert to peace.

Will the women who are now WAACS, WAVES, shipyard workers, and Air Raid wardens, members of Disaster Corps, neighborhood workers, most of whom were formally housewives and all of whom were potential

homemakers, be willing to return to pre-war status permitting their primary interest and effort to be directed towards the home? It would appear to me that an immediate readjustment cannot, and will not be made. There will be a period of readjustment between the unnatural situation when all of time and energy is directed in interests away from the home, and the natural position of homemaking, the care of children. It is this period that will require careful attention of every person and organization interested in the Post War World.

The Mother naturally is the center of the home unit. All the activities and interests revolve around her, and it is absolutely essential that she should return to normal. Of course it is understood that her entire interest will not remain in the home, but the home should be her prime interest. The danger, then, can be first, an extended period of readjustment during which time the evils resulting from secondary interest in home life, children, etc. will become more or less permanent. Second, the fact of a larger proportion of women retaining things other than the home as their prime interest, thus reducing proportionately a number of homes established. Third, the introducing of new activities which will demand the efforts of women.

I am convinced that any change in the position of women in the Post War World should point towards the strengthening of their initial interest in the home. True, their status will change, as it has changed. Their interest will have broadened. All of this can serve to build and strengthen the foundation of our American Civilization, "The Home." This *can* be so—it *must* be so.

Prospectus for Peace

RECENTLY, an inquiring reporter asked the following question in his column: "Do you believe that this war will end all wars?"

One typical answer was: "No, we fought the last war to end all wars, and look at the mess the world is in today! It has been necessary for the United States to engage in another world conflict, this time for our very salvation and our way of living. And we will have to fight again and again in future generations."

We have learned from Woodrow Wilson's experience with the last war that the desire for an effective and lasting peace must come from the people. The people must not lose sight of tomorrow's world, and they must earnestly desire to establish some form of international security; therefore, attitudes like the above are dangerous.

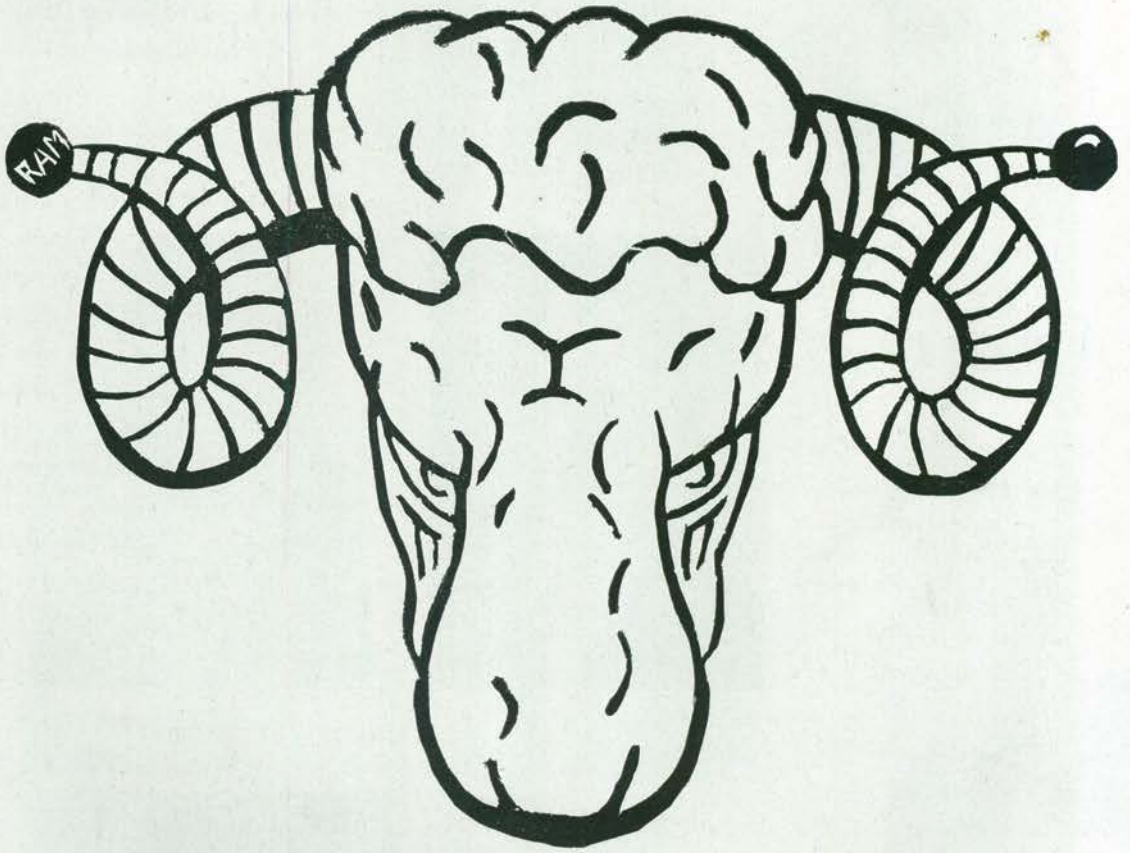
However, this security may not be established without sacrifice. It was admitted after the last war that the reason for the non-acceptance of the League in the United States was, among other things, due to the fact that "it was contrary to the traditional policy of isolation entertained in the U. S." and that "it was an infringement on our Monroe Doctrine." Yes, we were too busy worrying about our rights and traditions to think of the rest of the world. This ugly nationalism *must*, it cannot be exaggerated, **MUST** be overcome. If we do not intend to be plunged into the midst of the most costly and horrible war ever conceived, World War III, we must forget our selfishness.

Several types of peace plans have been proposed, namely: the Federal Union of Democracies, the Regional Federations, and the World Organization. The last, in my mind, is the most satisfactory proposition, for here is the

best security against World War III. . . . Regional or federal associations could lead to bloodier and more costly wars between regions or federations; however, the mere existence of a global union is not enough, as is indicated by the collapse of the League in the late 1930's.

When a spirit of cooperation and non-selfishness is developed, as I truly believe it can and will be, the forgers of the peace must make the next league strong enough to enforce its decisions. An international police force must be established. (It is a good sign that this idea seems to have been generally accepted by the people). The words "peace organization" must not be misinterpreted; for, as long as man lives, there will be someone who will look out for his own hide first. We must, therefore, be prepared to sacrifice a few lives, a few dollars to quell the inevitable uprisings. Suppose that the League had had a strong enforcement branch during the last ten years. We would have had to send 10,000 or so men into the Rhineland. We would have had to send 30,000 or so men into Manchuria. We would have had to send 50,000 or so men into Ethiopia. It might have been more or less, but the important point is this: If this number of men had been dispatched to those areas, we would not have become involved in this war, which has resulted in a cost 100 times more in men, an infinite number of times more in money, and an untold amount more in sorrow.

Today we have the advantage over the moulders of the last peace. We know the mistakes made last time, and we can correct them. We know that in union there is strength, but in discordance there are only endless wars and chaos. We know that nationalism and imperialism must be snuffed out. We know that we must create a world living in peace and harmony if civilization is to be preserved. This we can do. This we must do. This, by the grace of Almighty God, we will do.

what she willed. Hers is the personality of the teacher and the scholar. Happiness to her is a life of uninterrupted reading, studying, and writing. Happily, her great gift is a tremendous will to work.

The democracies had been her yardstick in reforming China. Then came war and sad realization that China was not alone in her short-comings. The Madame wrote—speeches, letters, articles. Hurriedly compiled by the government into *Messages in War and Peace*, these writings reveal her character and the maturity developed under the wear of war.

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Potently charming, brilliantly subtle, Madame Chiang Kai-shek is a woman. Symbol of a nation emergent, she is a statesman with a world ideal.

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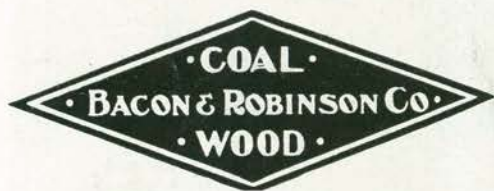
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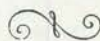
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
