TH Engineer Battalion (Separate) was activated on 5 May 1942 at Camp Gordon, Georgia under competent orders from the War Department with an original cadre of 32 enlisted men commanded by Major Herrol J. Skidmore and Captain Roy T. Dodge as the Executive Officer.

The cadre came from 378th Engineer Battalion (Separate) which was located at Camp Shelby, Mississippi at the time and arrived at Camp Gordon, Georgia on 5 May 1943.

Major Skidmore was the Assistant District Engineer of the Jacksonville Engineer District prior to assuming command

of this unit and reported at Camp Gordon, Georgia on 1 May 1942.

The unit was activated in the 4th Corps Area and initially assigned to the 3rd Army. Subsequently the unit was assigned to the 2nd Army, 1st Army Corps, Engineer Group, Camp Gordon, Georgia. The status of the unit remained unchanged until the activation of 3rd Detachment Special Troops, 2nd Army, at Camp Gordon, Georgia, at which time the unit became a component of that command.

Of the original cadre there still remain in the unit: First Sergeant Louvernious Jackson, Master Sergeant Willie H. Grant, and Staff Sergeant Olin Glover.

In September 1942 the unit was called upon to furnish its first cadre to a unit to be organized in Texas. The cadre selected was composed largely of men from Texas, who showed a great deal of joy and enthusiasm to be returning to their native state. With joy and glee, 7 officers and 95 enlisted men departed on 12 September 1942 for Camp Maxey, Texas, as cadre for the 354th Engineer General Service Regiment to the tune of "Deep In The Heart Of Texas," before a large crowd that bade them farewell and good hunting.

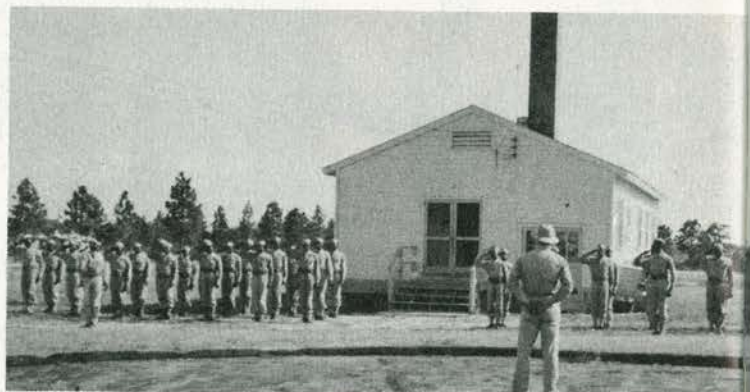
Concurrent with the activation of the 389th Engineer Battalion, Separate, requests were made to the Adjutant General for such previous historical records and distinctive insignia as might exist for any previous Engineer Unit designated as the 389th Engineer Battalion Separate.

Replies were received from the Army War College through the Adjutant General stating that no unit of this designation had been previously activated.

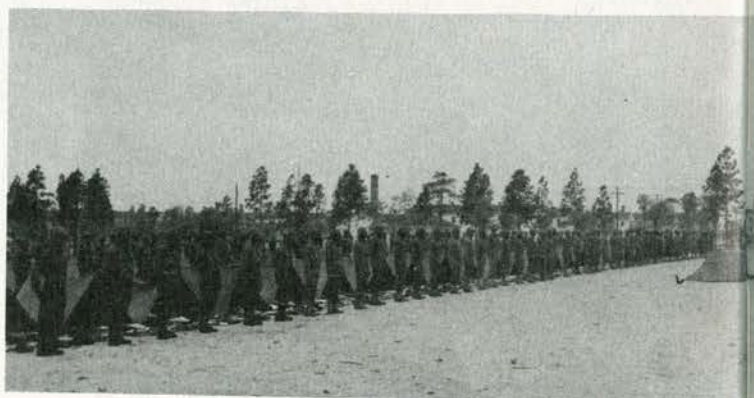
An informal competition was held among the officers and men of the Battalion to determine the design of the Coat-Of-Arms and the wording of the motto. Many designs were submitted; a design consisting of a spade shield and bridge bent on a field of red and white with the motto "Supportamus" was finally selected. This design was submitted to the Quartermaster General for approval as well as its indigenous construction.



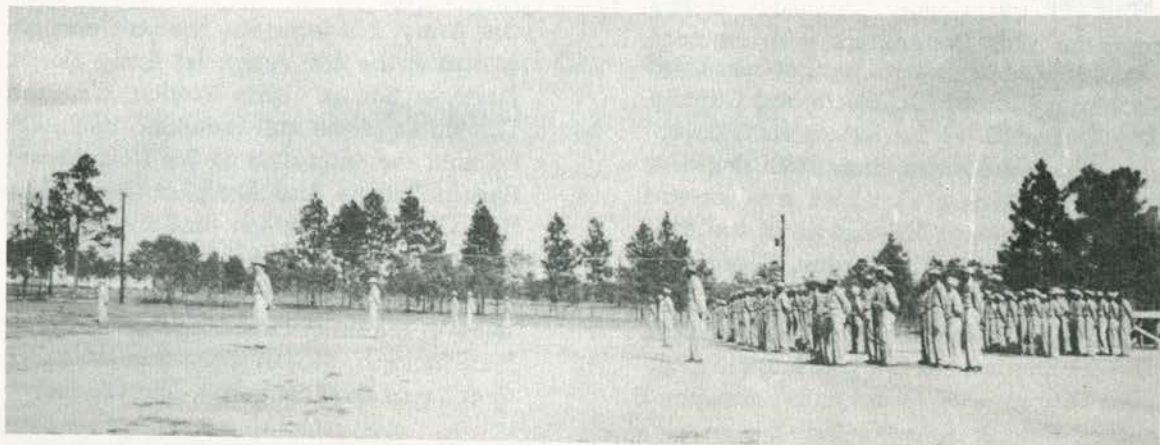
Camp Gordon, Georgia

After certain alterations the design and motto were approved.

Priorities in certain materials required for the manufacture of the insignia and a revision in War Department Regulations which prohibited the wearing of distinctive insignia for the duration of the war negated the manufacture and issue.

On 30 October 1942, the Commanding General, Second Army, directed the temporary change of stations of Companies A, B, and C for temporary duty with the 87th Infantry Division, Camp McCain, Grenada, Mississippi; the 100th Infantry Division, Fort Jackson, Columbia, South Carolina; and the 95th Infantry Division, Camp Phillips, Salina, Kansas, respectively. The directive pertaining to Company A was changed 2 November 1942, replacing it with Company D. The

directive pertaining to Company B was rescinded 5 November 1942.

Company C, commanded by First Lieutenant William C. Byrd, departed for Camp Phillips 1 November 1942, arriving there on 3 November 1942; Company D, commanded by First Lieutenant Virgil P. Rice, departed for Camp McCain 12 November 1942, arriving at its destination on 15 November 1942. Company C assisted in completing and improving existing camp facilities and unloaded and delivered equipment for the division as it arrived. Company C was commended for its performance of duty while at Camp Phillips by Major General Harry J. Malony, 94th Infantry Division Commander. Company C departed 19 December 1942, returning to Camp Gordon, 21 December 1942.

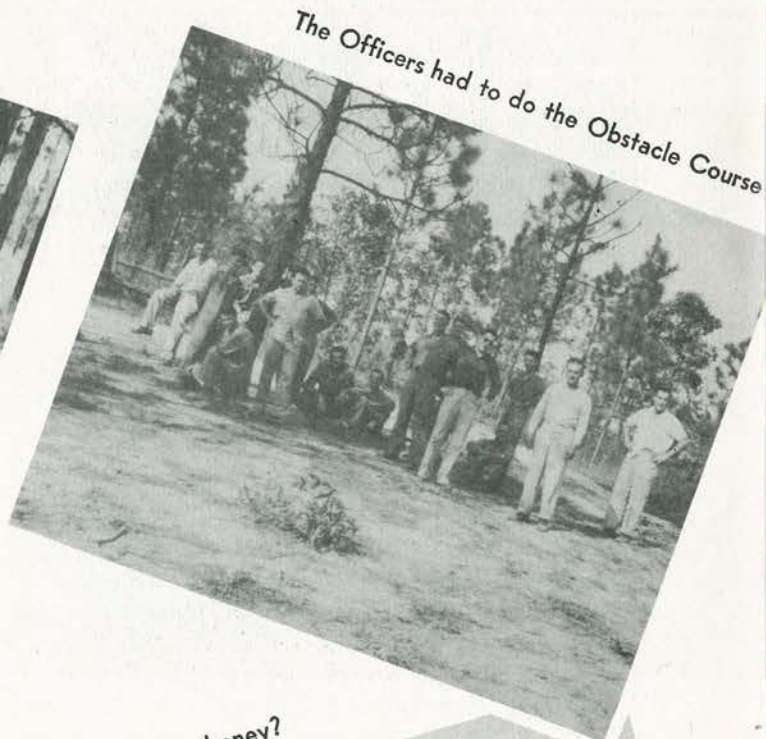

The training program was filled with much excitement for us raw recruits and now as we look back we remember quite vividly many things to us were very serious but now seem funny. 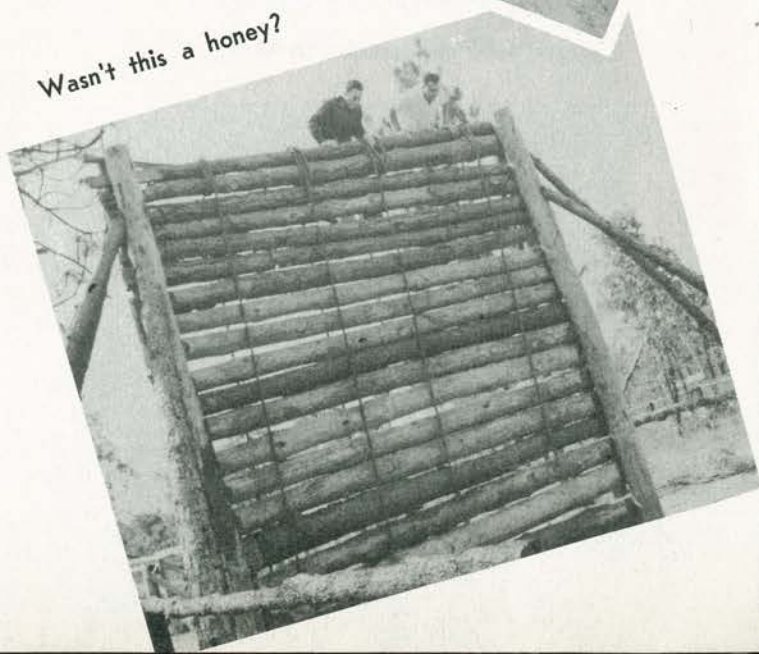

Company D performed duties similar to those of Company C and departed 1 February 1943 after a three week extension of temporary duty.

The original cadre of 32 enlisted men was swelled to around 300 by September 1942, and grew to approximately 1,200 by January 1943. With the increase in size the unit could then commence its full training program which began shortly after activation. It was through road marches, hikes, and obstacle courses that the "raw recruits" were disciplined and conditioned physically. "Old Red Rooster" (one of Georgia's steep, long, red hills) took her toll of many recruits who

Second Army required us to sing, "This Is The Army, Mr. Jones"—as though we were not aware of that fact.

There was the singing we had in the Old Recreation Hall that almost blew the top off the house. Then, too, were the Saturday afternoon entertainments such as log races and other games and contests. By the way, do you recall the "Flag Capture Exercises" those afternoons? And what about those hike songs?

In January 1943 the unit was again called on to furnish a cadre; this time to the Medical Detachment of the 210th Quartermaster Gas Supply Battalion which was stationed also at Camp Gordon. Four enlisted men departed 30 January 1943 for the said unit.

The unit status remained unchanged until after completion of Mobilization Training Program Test which were held 9-10 March 1943. Rating was satisfactory.

The Commanding General, Army Ground Forces directed the Commanding General, Second Army, to issue the necessary instructions to transfer the unit by rail at the earliest practicable date with permanent change of station and to relieve the unit from Second Army pending reassignment to the Desert Training Center upon arrival at that station.

On 19 April 1943, the Commanding Officer, 3rd Detachment, Special Troops, Second Army, Camp Gordon, Georgia, was directed by the Commanding General, Second Army to issue the necessary orders to effect the movement.

Immediately prior to departure for the Desert Training Center, the unit designated an enlisted cadre for the 574th Quartermaster Railhead Company with station at Camp Atterbury, Indiana.

An advance party preceded the unit, which departed from Camp Gordon for the new station in three trains. The trains departed 27 April 1943. Then started the six long days of train ride that took us across the continent.

The unit detrained at Ono, California, and was assigned station at Base General Depot, Communications Zone, Desert

Training Center, San Bernardino, California, on 3 May 1943.

Two days after the arrival of the unit at Base General Depot, San Bernardino, California, Company A was transferred to Clipper Mountain, California, to begin construction of a Division semi-permanent camp. Company A, under the command of Captain Edward M. Paul, departed by truck 5 May 1943, arriving at the construction site 6 May 1943 to find nothing but desert waste and sagebrush.

Company D, commanded by Captain Ernest H. Francis, was assigned the construction of a stockade at the Base General Depot on 5 May 1943. Work was started on 7 May and completed on 8 May. D Company was then assigned the construction of a semi-permanent Division Camp Granite, California, arriving there at 10 May 1943. One never forgets the latrines that had to be dug through granite rock there. Remember the prodigious feat performed one day by Tom Hardy?

Company C was immediately engaged with the construction of a rifle range at Cable Canyon, California, a few miles from the Base. The Company had the association of rattle snakes, deer, and other wild life in the not too unpleasant surroundings of mountain life.

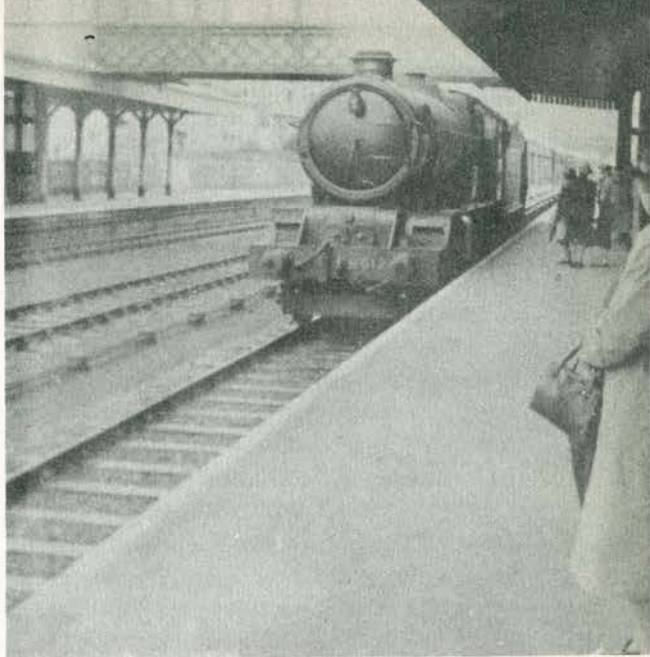
Company B moved to Camp Young, California, 10 May 1943, to use the range facilities there for individual record firing and upon completion thereof moved to Camp Clipper, California, 25 May 1943 to participate with Company A in the construction of Camp Clipper. Despite the intense heat, Company B made a creditable showing in the firing exercise.

All construction work on Camps Clipper and Granite was suspended 19 June 1943 and 389th Engineer Battalion (Separate) prepared for Desert maneuvers.

On 23 June 1943, the unit moved into tactical bivouac in the vicinity of Saltmarsh, virtually miles from nowhere, to assemble the various companies and to await initial disposition in the maneuver play. A water point was established at

Saltmarsh. Temperature of 140°F was recorded in the shade.

The Battalion, which was assigned to the Red Army, moved by truck and foot to the initial maneuver bivouac area five miles south of Parker Dam Highway and ten miles north of Palen Pass. Those that moved by foot will long remember the long hot march across Danby Dry Lake and, I am sure, never thought they would make the pleasant little bivouac picked for us in the dry wash. Just think! There were actually some trees there—on the desert! As a result of road reconnaissances in the concentration phase, a detachment from Company B under the command of First Lieutenant Alfred M. Sullivan, was left at Saltmarsh to main-

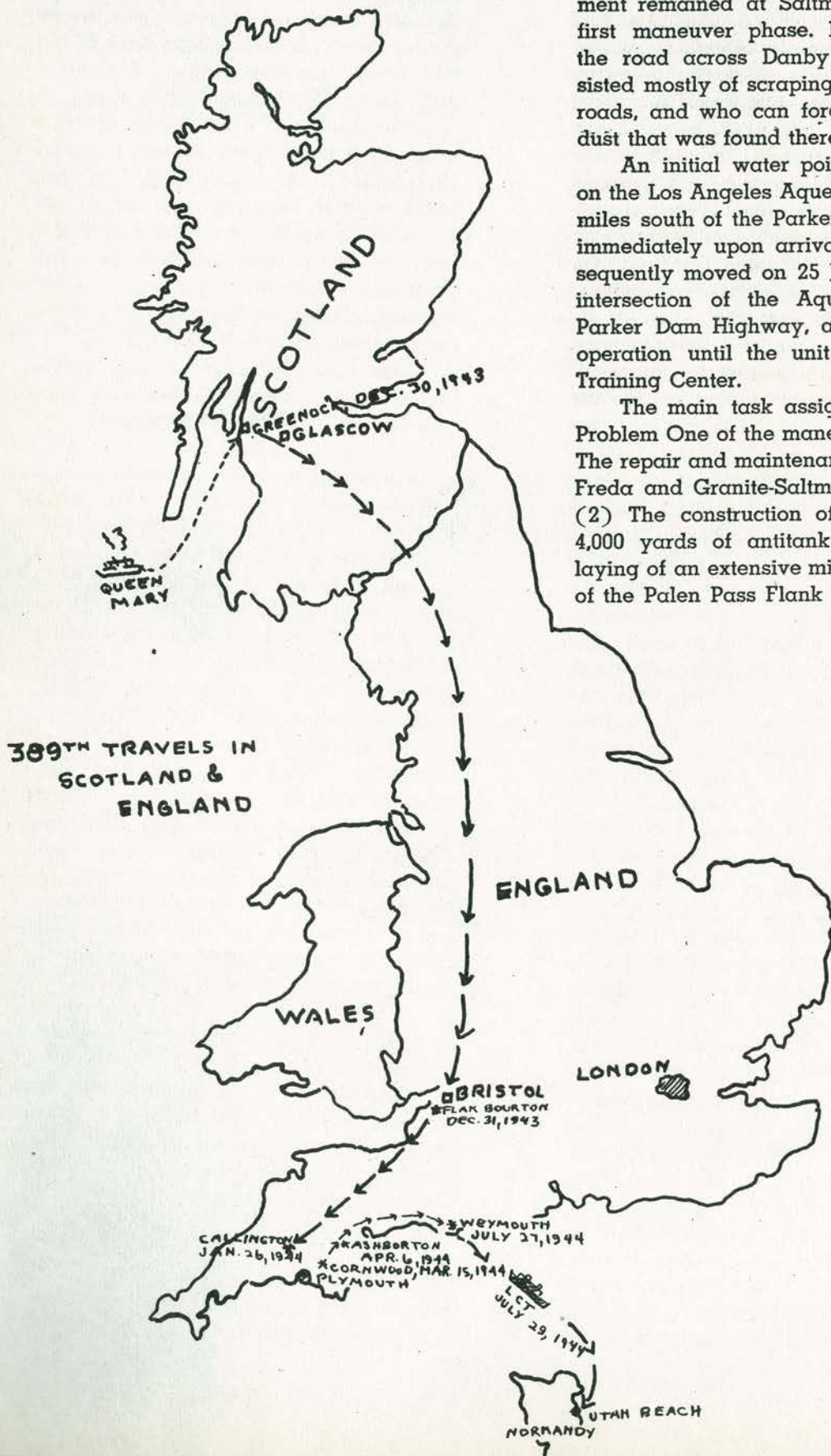

tain the Freda-Cadiz road. This detachment remained at Saltmarsh during the first maneuver phase. Maintenance of the road across Danby Dry Lake consisted mostly of scraping the dust off the roads, and who can forget the alkaline dust that was found there?

An initial water point was installed on the Los Angeles Aqueduct about three miles south of the Parker Dam Highway immediately upon arrival, but was subsequently moved on 25 June 1943 to the intersection of the Aqueduct and the Parker Dam Highway, and remained in operation until the unit left the Desert Training Center.

The main task assigned the unit in Problem One of the maneuvers was: (1) The repair and maintenance of the Cadiz-Freda and Granite-Saltmarsh roads; and (2) The construction of approximately 4,000 yards of antitank ditch and the laying of an extensive mine field forward of the Palen Pass Flank of the MLR and



RRL. The task was assigned 28 June 1943 and completed 29 June 1943. The unsuccessful negotiating of the mine fields and ditches and failure to utilize an opportunity for break-through by the attacking Blue forces resulted in the problem being extended until 3 July 1943. All road missions were successfully handled. Immediately upon conclusion of the problem the unit took up the mine fields from the OPLR, MLR, and RRL, completing the assignment 4 July 1943, and who will ever forget the dust and heat encountered here?

The unit moved to a bivouac area two miles south of Fenner for the initial disposition of problem two on 5 May 1943. A second disposition was made the same day and the unit moved to the vicinity of the intersection of U. S. Highway 66 and Telegraph Road. The Unit was then attached to the 355th Engineer General Service Regiment as supporting troops.

Because of the great distance the Blue Force had to travel to contact the Red defenses, the Red Army Commander directed a general forward movement, to increase density at the expecting line of engagement. Consequently the unit began on 7-9 July 1943 a shuttle movement to an area two miles north of the Railroad crossing on Powerline Road.

As the Red Army was engaged in the forward move, a strong advance Blue tank force exploited a weak defensive position. Company A, Company B, less one platoon, were successfully extricated from imminent isolation and returned to bivouac at U. S. Highway 66 and Powerline Road. Company C did not fare quite so well for over a hundred men, including one officer, were captured. The officer and men that were in front of the convoy were able to escape and carried news of the disaster. The Blue forces rapidly widened the break-through and threatened the Red Army rear C P at Fenner on 9-10 July 1943. Companies A, B, and D were used in the successful defense of the rear installations; Companies B and D assisting in "digging-in" four tank destroyer units in an area south of Fenner

and Company A, while employed as infantry in support of Red Army Headquarters, was destroyed by Blue Tank forces during an attack on the right flank of the Red Army defensive position. Maneuver play ended 1030 hours, 11 July 1943.

Post-maneuver assignments of road repair and mine recovery were received 15 July 1943. Companies H/S, C, (after being released from bondage), and D returned to Camp Granite 19 July 1943. Repair work on the Powerline Road between Goffs and Parker Dam Highway, and the Saltmarsh-Cadiz section of Freda-Cadiz road was completed 25 July 1943.

Simultaneously with road repair, mines were recovered at Palen and Styx Passes and Iron Mountain vicinity and were returned to Goffs.

Construction of the two semi-permanent camps were resumed upon release from control of Red Army 25-26 July 1943.

Companies B and D moved to Yuma, Arizona, 1 August 1943 to construct 8,000 feet of railroad siding in the East Yuma yards to improve facilities for an existing military installation. This work, in addition to tearing up 1,500 feet of existing track, was completed 9 August 1943.

All units, less detachments, moved to Coachella, California, 11-13 August 1943, upon notification of impending movement, to prepare for loading at Indio, California. Rail transportation facilities were overtaxed and the unit was delayed, during which time Companies A, C and D returned to Camp Granite, California, to continue construction activities, finally returning to load at Indio, California, 20 August 1943. The unit arrived in three trains at Camp Butner, North Carolina, 25-26 August 1943.

In August 1943 still another Engineer General Service Regiment was to be born of the 389th which on the 20 August 1943 sent a cadre to form the 1318th Engineer General Service Regiment at Camp Butner, North Carolina.

Upon arrival at Camp Butner, North Carolina our battalion found that it had grown to a regiment over night with several other separate battalions which had

been converted into Engineer Regiments by War Department Orders. We were assigned to the Fourth Service Command and were to undergo extended field service which began on 1 September 1943, with an extensive program in familiarization and qualification in all individual and crew-served weapons. Assignment of T/O shortages in enlisted men in small groups of non-engineer trained men necessitated constant revision of training.

The Unit was alerted for overseas movement on 2 November 1943. The readiness date for the unit was set at 1 December 1943. An advance detachment was prescribed at this time to consist of two officers, S-1 and S-4, and two enlisted men, with a readiness date of 15 November 1943. The unit, concurrent with training, immediately commenced preparations for movement under the provisions of "Preparation For Overseas Movement—Short Title: POM", and allied directives received during the period 5-20 November 1943.

A technical training inspection of the unit was made by Lieutenant Colonel Robert B. Gear and Captain G. M. Reece, Office of the Chief of Engineers, during 15-17 November 1943; conclusions were that the unit would be adequately prepared for movement overseas by 1 December 1943.

A formal inspection by Colonel Robert Hood, Inspector General's Department, was made during the period 22-23 November 1943 conclusions of his inspection were in full agreement with the representatives of the Chief of Engineers.

The advance Detachment, designated as shipment 1545-EX, composed of Captain James W. Millin, S-1; Captain John J. Bradley, S-4, Master Sergeant Raymond L. Adams, Regimental Sergeant Major; and Master Sergeant Willie H. Grant, Regimental Supply Sergeant, was ordered to move to the New York Port of Embarkation so as to arrive on or before 25 November 1943. The Detachment departed from Camp Butner for Camp Kilmer, New Jersey, 23 November, arriving there on 24 November 1943. The advance

detachment sailed for overseas duty on 5 December 1943 from New York, on Ship NY 612 "Atholone Castle." Debarkation was made on 17 December at Glasgow, Scotland; the unit immediately entrained for Savernake, Wiltshire, there to receive further orders to proceed to its final destination, Brockley, Somerset, and arriving there on 21 December 1943. The party prepared for supplies and the reception of the unit which was scheduled to arrive on or about 31 December 1943.

On 27 November 1943 the unit received warning orders of movement on or about 15 December 1943. This date was subsequently advanced to 6 December 1943. Final processing and transfer of unqualified personnel was completed in the period 1-4 December 1943. The unit was directed to move in two serials departing so as to arrive at Camp Shanks, New York, on or before 1600 6 December 1943.

The unit departed Camp Butner, North Carolina, on two trains. Train Number one, consisting of the First Battalion and Headquarters and Service Company, both under the command of Major Walter B. Tully, departed on 5 December 1943 at 1330 hours, and Train Number two, consisting of the 2nd Battalion and Regimental Medical Detachment, both under the command of Major Merle E. Wilson, departed 5 December 1943 at 1600 hours. Both trains arrived and were unloaded 6 December 1943 at Camp Shanks, New York Port of Embarkation, New York.

The Unit was processed during 7-11 December, was trained 13-21 December, and was alerted for embarkation 21 December 1943.

The Unit loaded aboard Ship NY 675, "Queen Mary" on 22-23 December 1943. The "Queen Mary" sailed 23 December 1943 at 1400 hours and at Greenock, Scotland, debarkation was made 30 December 1943 at 1900 hours.

The trip over in the "Queen Mary" was not without its bothers, for examples:

(1) Christmas dinner was enjoyed by only a few members despite the fact that a very delicious turkey dinner was served. Would you believe it—the Chap-

lain was among those missing? Could it be sea-sickness? (2) Some of the more sturdy members successfully consumed their Christmas dinner but were apparently overcome by pity for the starving fishes, or did I say they vomited after all? (3) Here may we pay due homage to those who retained the fine turkey with all its trimmings—those wonderful chowhounds who, despite the rough sea, were able to eat it all and even keep it down—lucky souls!

When it was all said and done we were very pleased to see the green hills of Scotland that greeted us on arrival. Then started our journey to South of England to the lovely green hills and valleys of Somerset on the funny little English trains with their silly whistles and all too soon we were introduced to British "Tea."

The unit entrained immediately in three trains for final station somewhere in the Isles of Great Britain.

The three unit trains arrived at Flax Bourton, Somerset on 31 December 1943 and 1 January 1944, were loaded and personnel and their equipment trucked to a 1,000 man British Nissen Hut (Bolero) Camp, near Brockley Hall. The Hall and grounds were used jointly with the 375th Engineer General Service Regiment, until their departure on 15 January 1944, as Regimental Headquarters and Motor Pool.

The Unit was assigned to Services of Supply, European Theater of Operations, upon its arrival in the Theater.

Orientation of the unit to military policies in the European Theater of Operations was sponsored by the 375th and 392nd Engineer General Service Regiments during the period 1-9 January 1944. Colonel Paschal N. Strong, Southern Base Section Engineer, inspected the unit on 10 January 1944, for status of orientation and removed the unit from the restrictions imposed upon all newly arrived elements. A recreational convoy departed that evening to Bristol for the first passes the organization had since the departure for overseas.

Training under the supervision of Southern Base Instructors, in mine field laying, detection, and removal of booby traps, chemical warfare, fire and air-raid precautions, was conducted during the period 11-16 January 1944.

Concurrent with orientation and training, T/BA and T/E equipment and supplies were drawn from widely spread supply installations, 85 per cent completion was gained by 23 January 1944.

Tentative construction projects were assigned to the unit 10 January 1944 by Engineer Group A, and advance parties departed 17 January to survey the job sites prior to the final disposition of troops. Improvements on roads, building and paths in Brockley Camp were carried out from the date of tentative assignments until the following movement of troops, based on reconnaissances, completed 19 January, were executed.

Company A was assigned an additional project at the 115th Station Hospital, Tavistock, Devon, 29 January 1944, for the construction of a filter bed and covered walkways.

Work was commenced on all projects by 1 February and continued, but



delayed by shortages in materials and equipment, through the months of February and March.

During this period, many other construction jobs were assigned. Company B was relieved of work at Brockley Camp and moved on 8 February 1944, to Stover, Devon, to continue construction of a 1500 man Bolero Camp. This project was completed and Company B then was assigned to assist in construction at Bickham and Saltram, the 1st and 2nd platoons reporting at Saltram and the company at Bickham on 19 February 1944.

On 21 February, Company B (less the 1st and 2nd platoons) moved to Princetown, Devon to continue construction of Merrivale Holming Beam Anti-Tank Range, originally assigned to Company C, 8 February and transferred to Company B on 21 February. The First Platoon rejoined the Company on 13 March; the Second Platoon on 22 March.

Improvement of the road net was ordered for Lupton House, and assigned to Company F on 10 February.

A complete Bailey Bridge was installed at Garabridge, by Company F during 17-25 February. The first platoon of Company F was detached on 19 February from work at Kitley to assist in the construction of Hemerdon and remained until completion of the project.

Road work on Saltram Camp was transferred to the 291st Engineer Combat Battalion on 15 February, at which time completion deadlines were advanced on all jobs to 15 March.

Honicombe project was partially transferred to the 1313th Engineer General Service Regiment on 25 February. Company A continued on roads and parking lots in Honicombe and on the hospital expansion near Tavistock.

Also during this period of construction, various individual tasks were assigned: Major Walter B. Tully and Major Merle E. Wilson were hardmasters in pre-invasion exercise "Duck II" 9-14 February; Captain Millin, Captain Francis

and Lieutenant Linzer oriented the 29th Infantry Regiment 26-27 February.

As the construction of camp projects approached completion, the unit was notified by XIXth District that it would assemble on or about 1 April at Hemerdon Camp for one month of training in accordance with Engineer Training Circular Number 2, Southern Base Section, 9 March 1944. Subsequent orders changed the assembly area to camps A and B at Cornwood.

Regimental Headquarters and Headquarters and Service Company moved to Cornwood B on 15 March and prepared areas and plans for the approaching training period. First and Second Battalion Headquarters moved at this time to Gunnislake and Hemerdon to locally direct the last phases of construction.

Companies arrived at Cornwood A upon completion of their projects as follows:

Company A 31 March 1944 1st Bn. Hq. 31 March 1944
Company C 29 March 1944 2nd Bn. Hq. 25 March 1944
Company D 25 March 1944 2nd Platoon, Co. B re-
Company E 26 March 1944 joined its unit 22 Mar.
Company F 28 March 1944 '44 at Merrivale

The training program was begun on 1 April, but was suspended 5 April and never resumed because of additional assigned construction and operational missions that kept the unit continually deployed.

The Second Battalion was assigned the construction of three tank pits for testing waterproofing of vehicles prior to embarkation. Sites near Newton Abbott, Brixham and Shinnars Bridge were assigned to Companies D, E, and F, respectively; the units departed for job sites on 6 April 1944.

The remainder of the unit, less Company B, moved to a tent camp near Ashburton, known as Hele Camp on 6 April 1944 to clear Cornwood A and B for use by newly arrived troops. Companies A and C improved the Camp area for use by the regiment until 17 April when Company C moved to Marshalling Area "K" Headquarters at Weston House, to install a complete 250 man tent camp. Company

A began operation of quarries to provide aggregates and road metals.

The unit was warned 21 April and alerted for the period 23-28 April 1944. Since projects were nearing completion, all work was expedited, completed and all units returned to Hele Camp on 22 April 1944. Alert preparations were completed and a modified training program was instituted during this period.

The unit was relieved from assignment to Services of Supply, Southern Base Section, on 23 April 1944, and assigned to Forward Echelon, Communications Zone, but remained attached to Southern Base Section for administration, supply and normal duties.

Further details as to the operational assignment of the unit, supplementing Engineer Circular Number 2, were received 11 April 1944. Consolidation of all directives indicated that the unit was satisfactorily prepared for its mission, but it was deemed advisable to retrain the unit in military subjects.

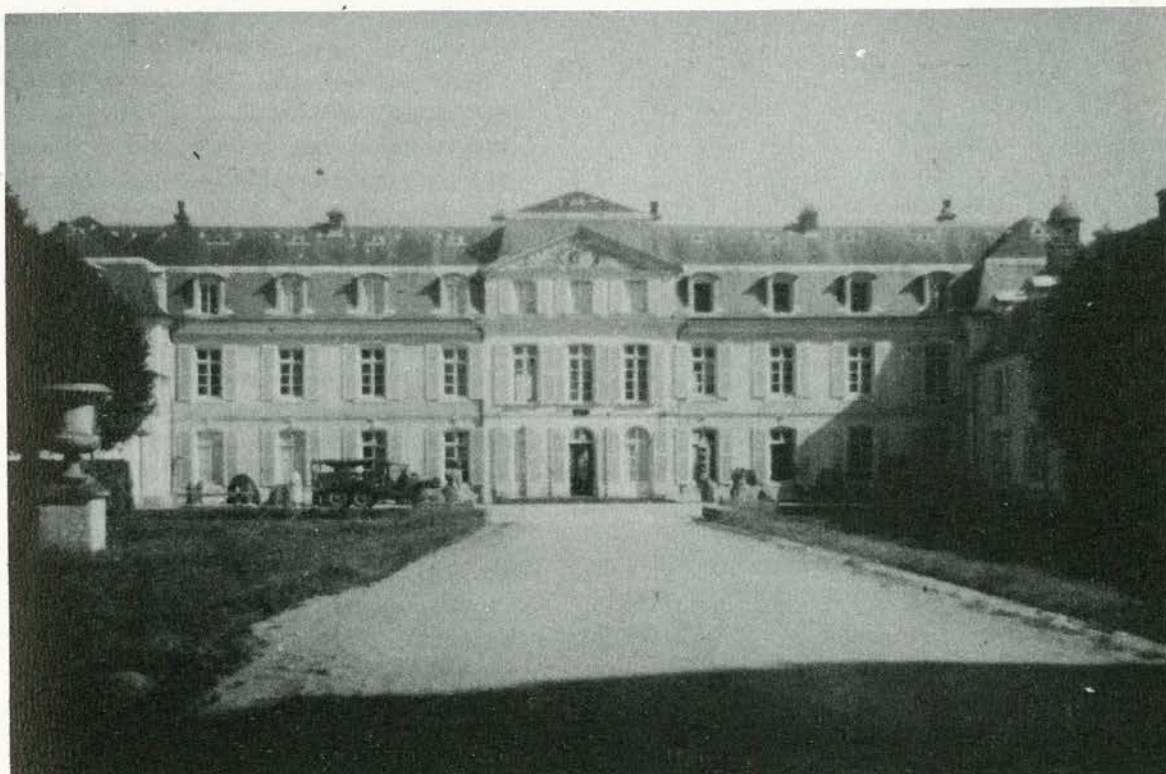
Assignment of training areas and tasks were made, and concurrent with the following tasks, training was performed during the period 1-27 May 1944.

The First Battalion constructed a class 40, 170 foot, triple-Single Bailey Bridge at Holne Bridge during 13-17 May 1944. This bridge was unique in that it was center piered with a trestle of bailey panels built up from stream bottom. All Companies of the First Battalion participated in the construction.

The Second Battalion constructed a class 40, 120 foot, double Bailey Bridge at New Bridge during 13-14 May 1944. All Companies of the Second Battalion participated in the construction. In addition, latrines were installed in marshalling areas, assembly area, at road control Regulating Points, and at embarkation hards. Improvements were at Syon Abbey POL dump, at Dean Prior, and again at Saltram, Hemerdon, and Kitley.

The regiment was alerted 26 May 1944 for deployment for close defense of

all Coastal Radar Stations against enemy airborne attack in the area East Looe, to Beer Head, Reconnaissances were made 27 May and the regiment deployed on 28 May 1944 as follows:

Twenty-four hour operations were maintained until relief from this duty 11 June 1944, at which time all units re-assembled at Hele Camp to continue training and prepare for movement to the continent.

"Salute the Soldier Week," a British national effort to promote funds for the prosecution of the war, was held during 27 May to 3 June 1944. Requests were made to the unit for participation and personnel of Headquarters and Service Company provided band music, gave exhibitions of American sports, and displayed and operated Engineer shops and heavy equipment in aid of the program at Ashburton.

The authorized strength of the unit was changed by directives and personnel were transferred to the 4001st and

4003rd Quartermaster Truck Companies 15 June 1944. Another large detail from all companies was placed on detached service on 16 June 1944, with the 29th Infantry Regiment, Ramsey, Hampshire, for detail as cadres for marshalling areas and embarkation hards at and near the Port of Southampton; the detail did not return to the unit until in the marshalling area immediately prior to departure for the continent.

Proficiency tests on basic military and technical subjects were held by the unit on 29-30 May. Results indicated a very satisfactory level of proficiency in all subjects.

Company A and Company C were assigned projects at Ordnance Depots 0-655 and 0-670 near Liskeard, Cornwall and Daylesford, Oxfordshire, during 22 June to 25 July 1944, to load ammunition for continental operations. Companies A and C returned to Hele Camp immediately prior to the departure of the regiment for the marshalling area.

The regiment was assigned camp clearance projects 23-28 June, at Modbury, Devon, Bovey Tracey, Devon, Plympton, Devon, Plymouth, Devon, Crown Hill, Plymouth; Engineer dump clearance and rail loading of heavy equipment at Grenofen, Tavistock, Devon, 24-27 June; Signal and Engineer dump clearance at Harberton, Devon and Paignton, Devon, 20-24 June; removal and storage of water system at Lupton House Camp, Devon 17-18 July; camp clearance at Torpoint, Cornwall and Tregantle, Devon 4-25 July; and clearance of mines, grenades and artillery duds in the Slapton Sands Assault Areas on Start Bay, 11-25 July 1944.

The regiment was alerted, effective 30 April 1944, by Forward Echelon, Communications Zone, by letter, which instructed that a minimum of five days warning from transportation Corps for movement could be expected on or after 25 May 1944, and to comply with the provisions "European Theater of Operations, United States Army, Preparation

for Overseas Movement, short Sea Voyage" dated 10 January 1944, as amended.

The regiment received a change of assignment from Forward Echelon, Communications Zone, to Advance Section, Communications Zone, all previous orders issued by Forward Echelon, Communications Zone, were held in effect.

All operations and training of the unit thereby modified 1 May 1944 and inspections, show downs, practice loadings and techniques were performed from that date forward, combined as well as operational assignments permitted.

On 1 and 5 July, the 6805th, 6806th, 6807th, 6808th, 6809th, 6810th, and 6811th Engineer Welding Detachments were attached to the regiment for processing for overseas movement.

Advance Section, Communications Zone, completed necessary instructions required to poise the unit for departure in marshalling areas for movement to the continent.

Early arrangements were made for the detailing of an Advance Party, consisting of Second Lieutenant John T. Moore, Master Sergeant Louis T. Criner and Technical Sergeant Joe D. Mike, to the 374th Engineer General Service Regiment, which arrived in France 15 July 1944.

Movement instructions were received from the Exeter District Transportation Officer on 24 July 1944, which directed the movement of the unit in seven road convoy serials and one rail movement for personnel so as to arrive in marshalling area D 27 July 1944. Final preparations were completed and the unit departed from Hele Camp on 27 July 1944 by 1900 hours.

Craft loading instructions, sea voyage supplies and rations were received, embarkation rosters for personnel and vehicles were checked and corrected, troops were briefed and craft commanders appointed on 28 July 1944.

Elements of the regiment began moving to Cornhill Hards 29 July at 0430 hours, the last element leaving 29 July at

0835 hours. All units, including a marching party, completed loading into LCTs and LSTs, by 29 July at 1830 hours, and all craft left loading hard for the rendezvous in the English Channel.

The convoy actually went under way on 30 July and arrived at Utah Beach early in the morning 31 July 1944.

On reaching the French side of the Channel the tide receded as water unto her hiding place and took her own time returning. It was about noon before the Notorious 389th was to make her exit from the sea to land upon the bosom of historical Utah Beach. The unit moved off in file, some walking, some riding, some being aided by their buddies along the dusty road to the assembly area. Upon reaching the bivouac site some of the new arrivals began their conversation thusly: with one of the Mademoiselles, "Parlezvous anglais, Mademoiselle?" The response being "Non, non." Then the retort was made, "Parlez-vous français?" The reply, "Oui, oui."

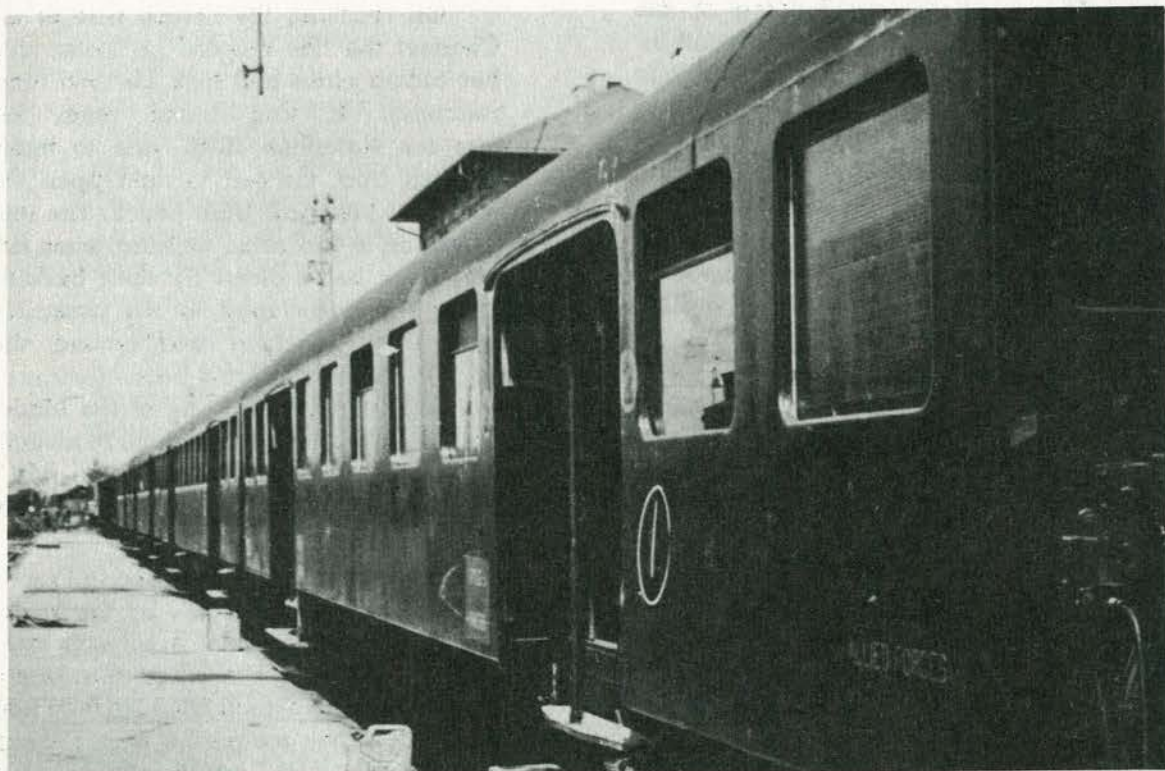
The conversation continued in French and a statement was made by the Mademoiselle to the Polygat who was over duly curious, that she hated the Americans, they are no good because they had driven her lover away—he was a Kraut. Conversation sadly and woefully ended "toute suite" and the Polygat's company could then utilize his services, for he no longer wished to "Parle-avec Mademoiselle" (speak with the girl).

Debarkation began at 0900 and continued until 1700, all elements moving directly to Transit Area B for assembly. The advance party met the unit at this point, and the regiment, pursuant to instructions conveyed by Lieutenant Moore, moved by road convoy to Cerisy la Foret, all units arriving prior to 31 July at 2300 hours. Camp areas were selected and the unit went into bivouac by 1 August 1944 at 1200 hours.

Upon arrival at the 1st bivouac area in France we were well entertained and amused by a group of very unpleasant company-helpers shortly after midnight

when the Luftwaffe came over with unusual fury seeking whom he could devour, ending the sleep and slumber for more pleasant foxholes which greeted us. The uniform was varied from full-dress, to some dress, to no dress. The Commanding Officer ordered that a careful check

ly 1½ miles southeast, with regimental Headquarters at Le Vauchale, to construct 1,000 bed hospitals at each of the sites. Damage to the Port of Granville, and the fact that the forecast of operations was not achieved tactically, precluded this assignment.

of the area should be made to ascertain if everyone was at his post of duty, which was the foxhole. Upon careful check the report was made, "all present and accounted for, sir". All men were well camouflaged and safe in their slit-trenches. So we bade the Luftwaffe a pleasant good-night, and all returned to our sacks for a pleasant and joyful night.

In the original pre-invasion plan, the regiment was to have debarked at the Port of Granville and to have moved to three sites at: (1) Le Vauchale, approximately 7 miles north of Rennes; (2) La Chopinais, approximately 7 miles north of Rennes; and (3) at Vitre, approximate-

Alternative assignments had been prepared and 1,000 bed hospitals, phase 1, construction tasks were undertaken on 1 August 1944 approximately one mile northeast of Lison by the First Battalion and approximately 1½ miles northwest of Le Haye du Puits, by the Second Battalion. Regimental Headquarters and Headquarters and Service Company remained at Cerisy la Foret. Work was begun on both projects 2 August 1944.

On 9 August, the Second Battalion project, approximately 25% complete, was transferred to the 1310th Engineer General Service Regiment and maintenance of the Bricquebec-St. Sauveur-LeHaye Du

Puits - Lessay - Periers - St. Jores - Valogres road network was assigned to the Second Battalion. The First Battalion was relieved from the Lison hospital task, effective 9 August at 1200 hours, and directed to report to the Deputy Engineer, Northwest of Valogres for assignment to the construction of a headquarters for Communications Zone, prior to 10 August 1944 at 1200 hours. All First Battalion units departed Lison area and arrived at job site, approximately 2 miles north of Valogres, on 10 August 1944.

The First Army break-through at St. Lo 21-30 July, heavily exploited by Third Army mechanized forces, created unplanned demands at this time upon rail communications through the Le Mans area toward Paris for the supply of POL and ammunition for Third Army tank elements. Previous engineer missions of many Engineer units were changed and the 389th (less 1st Bn.) was committed to emergency first line railroad rehabilitation, maintenance and repair.

Headquarters, Headquarters and Service Company, and the Second Battalion began railroad operations on 13 August 1944, that were to be continued until the German border was reached.

Parties were dispatched to reconnoiter the line La Chapelle-ANTHENAISE-SILLE Le GULLAUME as the unit moved on 13 August to areas near NEAU and ROUESSE DE VASSE. Work was commenced on this line immediately as the completion date was set for 15 August at 1200 hours. The task was completed 15 August at 1200 hours. The unit was commended for its work by the Engineer Advance Section, Communications Zone, 29 August 1944. The Regiment captured its first German prisoner at Neau—a German paratrooper.

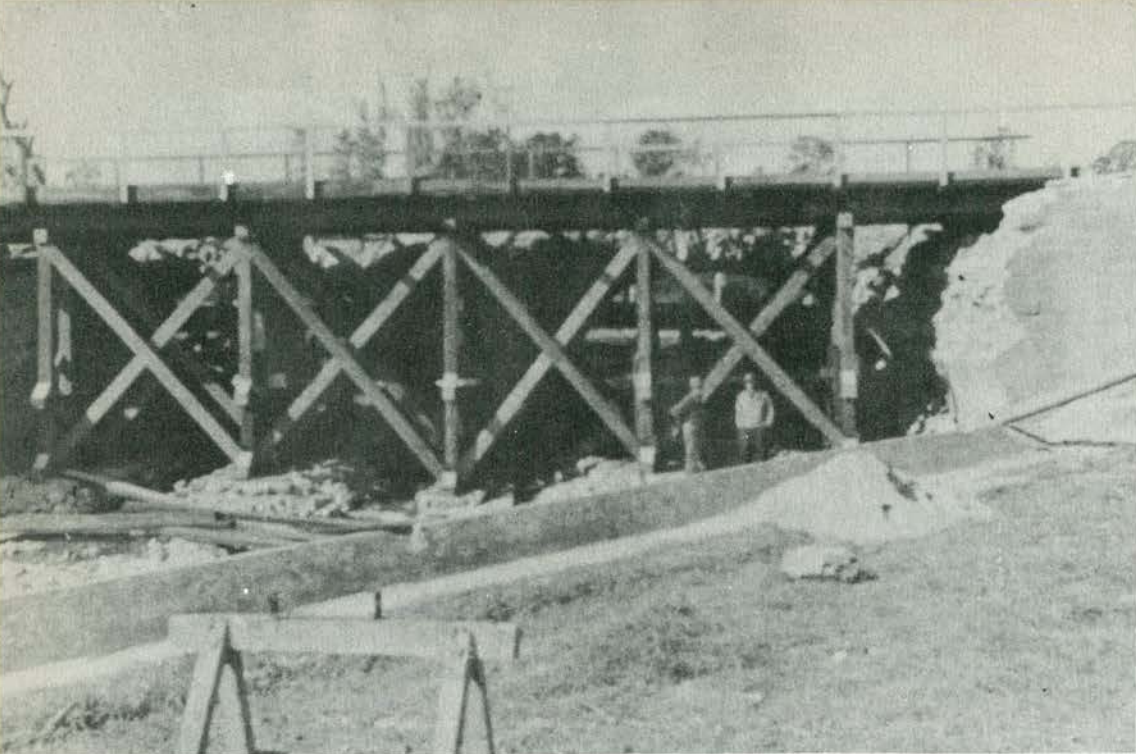
Work was continued on the Sille yards near NEAU until 15 August. Orders were issued 15 August, for the construction of 2 general hospitals in the Le Mans Area, at La MILESSE, to be performed by the unit, and on 17-18 August, Companies D and E moved to LA MILES-

SE to begin one of the projects. Additional assignments were made during this period to the unit as follows: (1) clearing mines at Ammo Depot 0-513, 5 miles Southeast of Le Mans, assigned to Company E; (2) POW stockade near Le Mans assigned to Company F; (3) a logging project near FORET DE SEVER; (4) clearing mines for 25th Regimental Station 4 miles southeast of St. POIS, assigned to Company E; (5) drawing and processing 500 POWs. Movements of all units to the work site and Regimental Headquarters to Chateau de Perrais, Parigne la Polins, were completed by 17 August 1944.

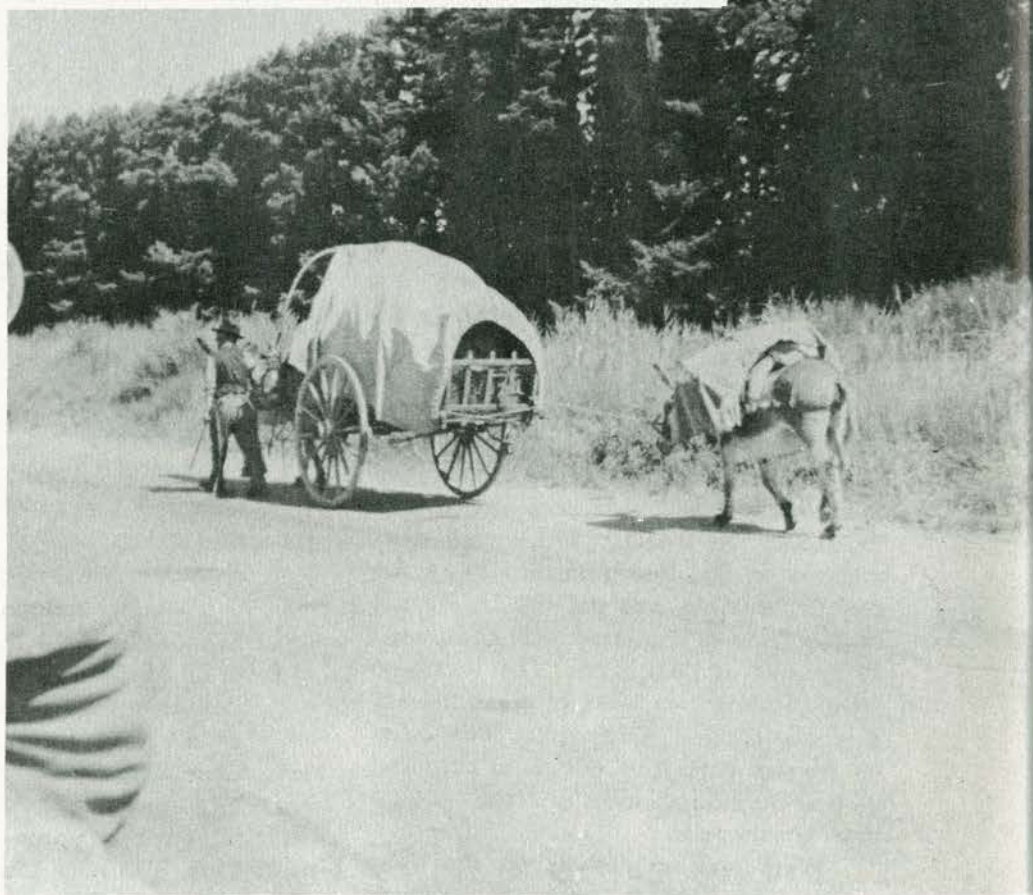
All assignments were again cancelled and on 19 August 1944, the unit again was committed to priority rail rehabilitation of the single line ECOUSCHE-ARGENTAN-SURDON to be commenced prior to 20 August at 1200 hours and completed by 22 August at 2400 hours. Extensive damage had been made to the line and yards, especially in ARGENTAN yards, and reconnaissance parties and elements of all 2nd Battalion companies were sent to begin repairs on 20 August.

The Commanding General, Advance Section, Communications Zone, directed the formation of Engineer Groups on 23 August 1944 and the regiment was attached to Advance Section Engineer Group A and remained a component of that group until its return to Normandy Base Section in September.

Work assignments on the line ECOUSCHE-SURDON were extended first to LE MERLERAULT and then to LAIGLE, double tracks with single track priority by 27 August at 1200 hours, completion of a single track line, opened to traffic 28 August, by 31 August. Additional passing tracks in yards at ALENCON, ARGENTAN, SURDON, LAIGLE, ST. GAUBERGE, and coal and water facilities at ARGENTAN, SURDON, SEES, LA HUTTE-COLOMBIERS, and ST. GAUBERGE were installed concurrent with the rehabilitation of second tracks during 27 August-4 September. A material dump at SURDON

was inventoried and operated during this period. Reconnaissances were continuous, and as work progressed, parties were sent beyond PARIS to check expected work requirements.

Because of the great distance to be moved on 31 August 1944, the Regimental Headquarters moved from Chateau Perrais to Vernieul so as to reduce the movement distance to the next location. Companies also moved their bivouacs progressively forward to quicken moves beyond PARIS.

Rehabilitation of double track from CREPY-EN-VALOIS to SOISSONS by 10 September at 1200 hours was assigned 5 September. All previous projects were either rescinded or transferred to other group members, such that the unit could effect the move intact. Units began movement beyond Paris on 5 September, arriving at Villiers-Cotterets 6 September. A four-steel coach assembly was obtained at Villiers-Cotterets; the interiors were stripped for use as offices and quarters for Regimental Headquarters and Staff. Reconnaissances were made beyond LAON by teams of the 2nd Battalion. A relatively small amount of work was required to rehabilitate the whole line and by 9 September all units were ready to move to a new assignment. By 10 September the unit was located in HIRSON to begin work on several assignments; (1) Double track LIART-HIRSON by 12 September at 2400 hours, (2) Single track HIRSON-ANOR-CHIMAY by 12 September at 2400 hours, (3) Double track ANOR-AVESNES-MAUBEUGE, (4) HIRSON yard restoration, and (5) Double track HIRSON-CHARLEVILLE. These assignments were extended on 13 September to include complete rehabilitation of double track MAUBEUGE-MONS-HAINE ST. PIERRE - PIETON - CHARLERIO and double track MAUBEUGE-JEUMONT-ERQUELINNES - FAUROEULX - HAINE St. PIERRE. Rehabilitation of yards at Marchiennes was also directed. HIRSON yard work, determined from unit reconnaissance, was assigned to a group member.

Second Battalion Headquarters and Company D moved progressively from HIRSON to ANOR to HAINE ST. PIERRE, and Company F from HIRSON to BERLAIMONT to MONS as work on the line was completed. Regimental Headquarters moved from HIRSON to FONTAINE L'EVEQUE, arriving 16 September 1944. Warning orders of reassignment of the unit to Normandy Base Section or about 20 September 1944, were received 16 September, but additional assignments were issued and work continued on previous assignments. The new assignments included rehabilitation of yard facilities at PIETON, HAUTMONT, LA SAMBRE, MAUBEUGE, JEUMONT, and CHARLEROI; double track NAMUR-MARLOIE; the clearance of rail bridge wreckage over the MEUSE River in NAMUR, including the preparation of approaches; and reconnaissance of the line—La PAIX-MANAGUE - LUTTRE - RANSART. Work was commenced on the NAMUR rail bridge 21 September by Company E, while Company D and F crossed the MEUSE to GINEY and SART BENARD for work on the NAMUR - CINEY - MARLOIE line.

Movement instructions were received 24 September and the unit effected a consolidation at FONTAINE L'EVEQUE and departed for LA HAYE DU PUIT, Normandy, France, by motor and rail, on 25 September 1944, arriving there on 29 September 1944. The unit was commended by Colonel Helmer Swenholt, Commanding Advance Section Engineer Group A and by Colonel E. C. Itschner, Advance Section Engineer, for the manner of performance of the unit during the period.

The First Battalion, which had remained in Normandy Base Section to assist in construction of Communications Zone Headquarters, passed into Regimental Control on 1 October 1944, thereby effecting consolidation of the Regiment.

The First Battalion, Commanded by Lieutenant Colonel Ammon N. Hartman, had worked with the 364th Engineer General Service Regiment in the construction

of a complete Communication Zone Headquarters installation. Areas 1 and 3 were the responsibility of the First Battalion and included in Area 1, the complete remodeling and repair of a Chateau and the erection of Dallas hutting for use of the Commanding General, Communication Zone and the General Staff and, in Area 3, complete headquarters installations for the Engineer, Transportation and Signal Sections of the command. Each area was a complete Phase III camp, with accommodations for officers and living quarters. Work was discontinued on the project which was completed but for electric wiring on 3 September as Communications Zone Headquarters was now able to secure Headquarters in Paris.

The First Battalion was assigned continual Red-Ball road maintenance on N-13 immediately upon release from communications Zone Headquarters' project and continued until further assignments were received by the Regiment upon return to Normandy Base Section.

By 5 October 1944, the unit was disposed and working on projects as follows:

Projects originally assigned the First Battalion were absorbed and with new assignments, all were reassigned with sectoring in view. All Red-Ball and Green-Diamond Routes were maintained by the Regiment (less companies E and F) during the period 1 October-24 November 1944.

The First Battalion was again detached 16 October to Utah District; Normandy Base Section. The remainder of the unit was assigned to Granville District, Colonel Skidmore becoming the District Engineer.

Prior to the detachment of the First Battalion, the following projects were assigned to it: (1) Construction of a 20,000 man POW Stockade at Nacqueville, completed 16 October 1944. (2) Maintenance

of Red-Ball and other routes, (3) Construction of a class 70 highway bridge at St. Saviour, (4) the installation of night-lighting of facilities at railheads in Carreutan and Chef du Pont (5) improvement of roads in Depots E-505 and E-501.

The Second Battalion was assigned the construction of TCRP's 7 & 8 at Coutances which included the operation of a quarry by Company D near Coutances to private rail for TCRP hard standings. Upon release of the First Battalion, uncompleted projects were transferred to the 1308th Engineer General Service Regiment and all road maintenance in Granville District was assigned to the Second Battalion, the major portion being assumed by Companies E and F, who returned on 23 October from construction of road and rail facilities in the Couville Marshalling Yards.

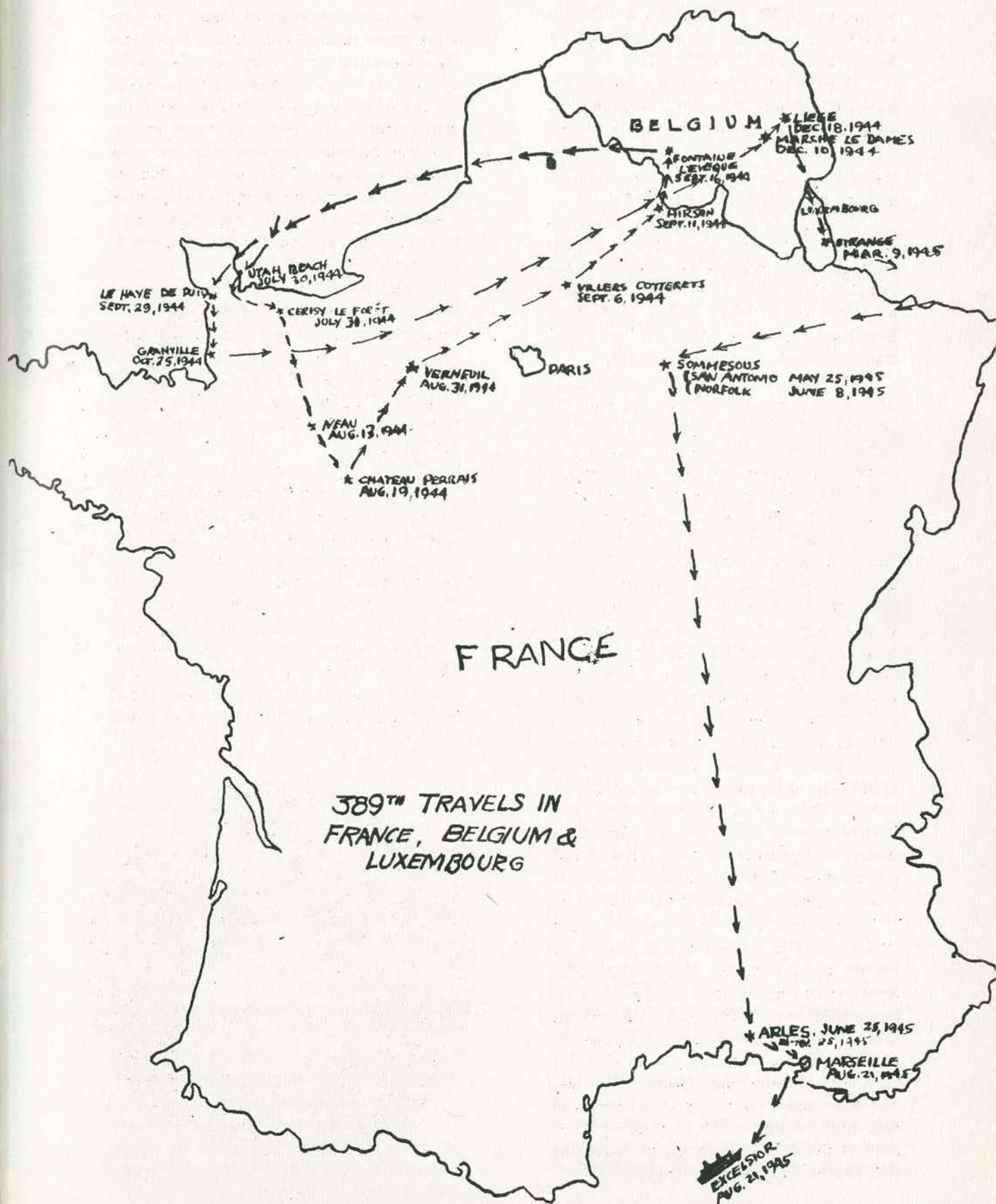
Regimental Headquarters and Headquarters and Service Company moved to Granville on 26 October 1944, to facilitate control of Engineer projects in the district. The Second Battalion was assigned additional projects in the district. The additional projects assigned the Second Battalion at this time were as follows: (1) location of Map boards at TCRP 6 & 7, (2) erection of a 250 man POW Stockade at Marigny, (3) construction of bridges at Tessy-Sur-Vive and Torigny-Sur-Vive, and (4) road maintenance extending into Seine Base Section.

Upon completion of all moves to the above locations, the period 23-30 October 1944 was used, concurrent with work projects, readjustment in strength of the unit to recondition company organizations.

Road assignments were made 1 November to extend and increase capacity of road networks in the District, including restoration of roads in Vire, improve-



ments at TCRP 1 (Torigni) 2 (Caudaville) and erection of a triple double Bailey Bridge at GOURFALUER.

The maintenance of the Ducey-Agneaux-Cherbourg Powerline was assigned 8 November, the construction of a railroad bridge at Villedieu on 9 November, the rehabilitation of the Folligny railhead and yards on 12 November 1944.

During this period the First Battalion was assigned construction of Utah District Headquarters, winterizing roads at Depot 501, 18 October 1944; a 500 man POW enclosure at St. Mere Eglise, 18 November; road repair at 0-602, 21 November, and at Periers, 25 November, 1944.

The unit was reassigned to Advance Section Communications Zone as of December 1st, 1945. Preparation for this movement was made in the last days of November and the unit moved by rail and motor transport on 5 December, arriving in Leige, Belgium on 10 December 1944. Initial assignments for the unit were changed several times during the period of movement, at first being apparent that the unit would join a railway group, but final assignment was made to a construction group, Advance Section Engineer Group D. Regimental Headquarters and Headquarters and Service Company initially were located at Marche-Les-Dames. The First and Second Battalions went directly to Jemeppe and Bressoux respectively, both suburbs of the city of Leige. Regimental Headquarters and Headquarters and Service Company moved to Bressoux, Belgium on the 18th of December 1944, to be near the center of work projects assigned to the unit.

Assignments of road maintenance and general construction work were received from Engineer Group D in Man hour requirements, such that they could be considered a Battalion task assignment. The First Battalion was assigned all road maintenance and repair of the Military nets of Leige and vicinity. The Second Battalion was assigned the construction and improvement of existing facilities at the 58th Quartermaster Base Depot, located in Bressoux, Belgium.

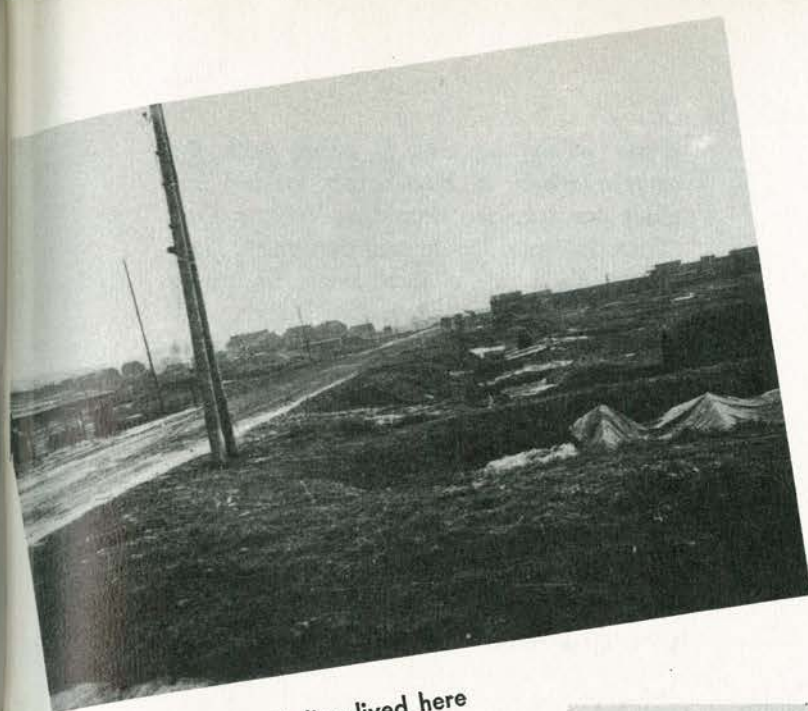
Reconnaissances of both projects were made immediately and it was readily apparent that the major problem to be overcome in both tasks assigned. Work on both assignments, however, was initiated with the materials on hand, following the complete turnover of all work projects from the 364th Engineer General Service Regiment on 9 and 10 December 1944. The First Battalion assignment was divided into sectors for allocations to Companies A, B, and C.

The whole of the First Battalion moved from its temporary quarters in Jemeppe during 12 to 17 December 1944; Company A to Seraing, on the west side of the Meuse River, Company B and the First Battalion Headquarters to Leige, and Company C to Jupille, on the east bank of the Meuse.

Three (3) separate project assignments were issued to complete the construction required at the 58th Quartermaster Base Depot; project G-205, included storage, complete with concrete floors, open storage, sorting area, network of roads and railways, internal lighting, administration buildings and drainage. Project G-203 assigned outdoor lighting in the four (4) storage areas in the complete railhead, and Project G-188 assigned improvements on existing roads.

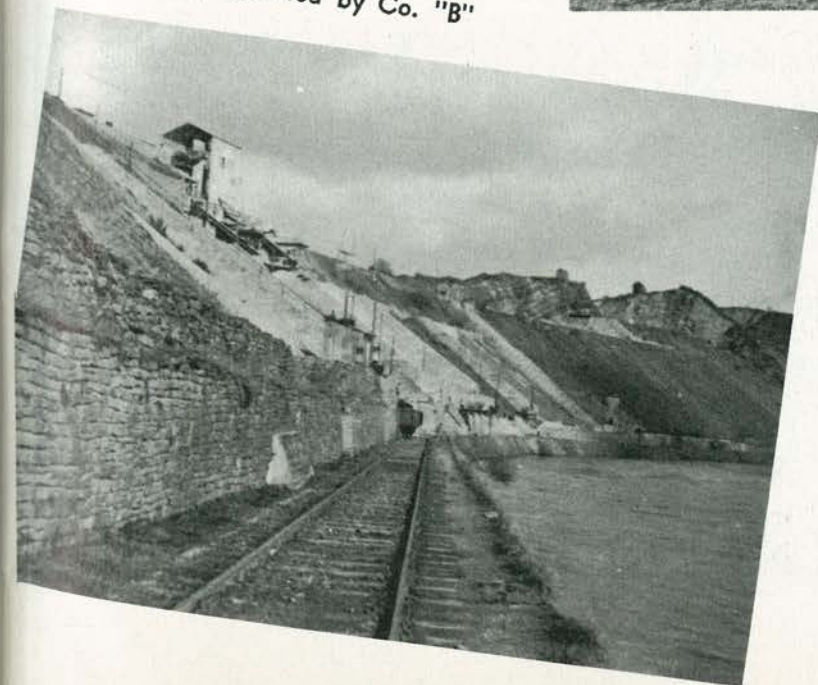

and railways facilities in the Depot rail-head, not included in project G-205.

By 16 December 1944, robot bomb attacks upon the city of Leige increased in intensity and intelligence was received that the possibility of a German attack poised in the direction of Leige was imminent. The companies located in Leige during this phase of the war were billeted in different parts of the city as was necessary to complete their respective combat missions in the minimum amount of time. We, after having been oriented to modern warfare, had had a period of relaxation which made the robot bomb

attack a new experience of combat to the unit. The only places of refuge were basements of churches, schools, and other buildings. When refuge was needed all individuals assumed oneness in seeking a hiding-place. Many of us braved the time, but there were others of us lacking in fortitude to brave the rattling and uncertainty of the Robot, making hiding paramount whenever the bombs approached the city.

There were some living on the train in steel pullman coaches which for the Robot was only the web-of-a-spider, being in knowledge of this fact they, too, with other loyal members of the unit, desiring

to complete the task, found it necessary to seek all available refuge, which was only the bare shadows of the railroad track. The Chaplain being loyal to the cause also and having always the motto of "Follow Me whethersoever, I go"—became the official radar unit of the outfit and warned of attacks and abruptly led the way to safety of the shelter. Quite often it is told by many of us, certain stumbling-blocks were in the Chaplain's path, but, as our French comrades speak, "they were moved 'Toute-suite'."

The 389th Engineers did not escape the Buzz-bomb seige entirely unscarred. Lieutenant Kelly and a group of his men

came within an ace of being with the angels when a buzz-bomb landed too close for comfort, denuding Private First Class Solomon Davis and deafening Lieutenant Kelly for a short time. Definitely injured men received Purple Hearts.

The First Battalion Headquarters on or about 27 December 1944 and B Company received a very close hit on their quarters in The Ecole De Bonne Femme. The bomb hit about 150 feet from the buildings, killing and injuring a number of civilians, as well as injuring our own men. The First Battalion Medical Detachment under Sergeant Fields was on the spot immediately and within a few min-

utes had commenced treating and evacuating patients (Civilian and Military), to hospitals. Work by First Battalion Medical Detachment was progressing satisfactorily and within a few minutes The Regimental Detachment and Surgeons arrived. Members of Company B performed prodigious and helpful labor in freeing the civilian people from the debris and wreckage. First Battalion Medical Detachment and Company B received commendation from the Regimental Commanding Officer for their work and aid given to the civilians.

The First Battalion built up stock piles of road materials, designated alternate Military routes and organized 24 hour operations in preparation for any destruction done by the enemy.

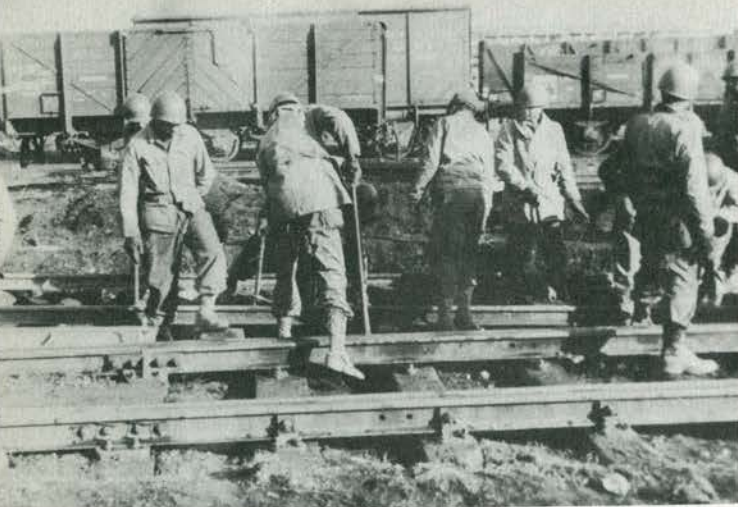
By 16 December 1944, the initial attack of the enemy was begun in the Ardennes Sector, accompanied by infiltration tactics by land and by air. The First Battalion was directed to assume guard of all installations such as locks and bridges along the Albert Canal from Liege to Hasselt. Work on the projects assigned was continued through this period, however, but was hampered by transportation and supply problems.

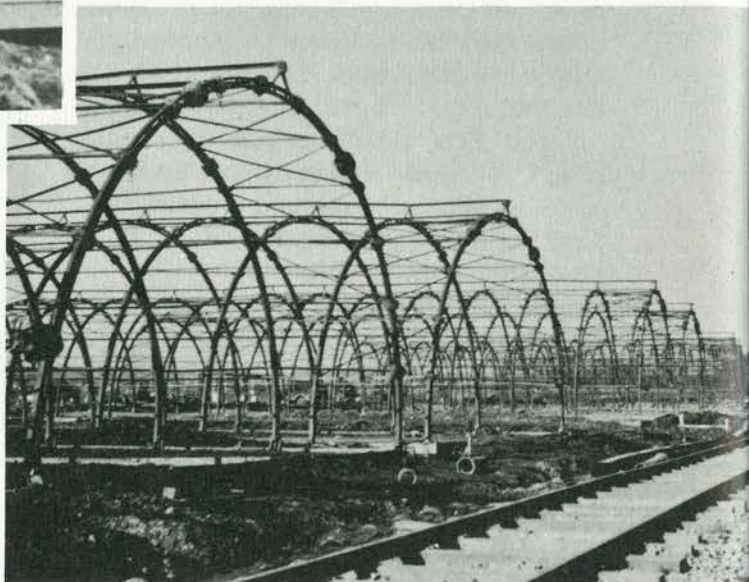


Rail work; Liege, Belgium

By 8 January 1945, the success of the enemy break-through was completely stopped. During the period of the German offensive, improvements to the road network at TCP-15, and at Kinkemopois POL Storage Area were assigned to and completed by, the First Battalion. Work on construction of hard standing at Depot S-892 in Jupille was commenced by the First Battalion on 30 December 1944.

Snow and ice-fall became an additional responsibility of the First Battalion during this period, and was to be continued during January and February. Con-

current with the return of Communications Zone Supply facilities to a normal level, the unit increased its procurement by utilizing, operating, and controlling such civilian agencies and plants that were necessary to maintain an adequate supply of materials for the construction work being done at the 58th Quarter-



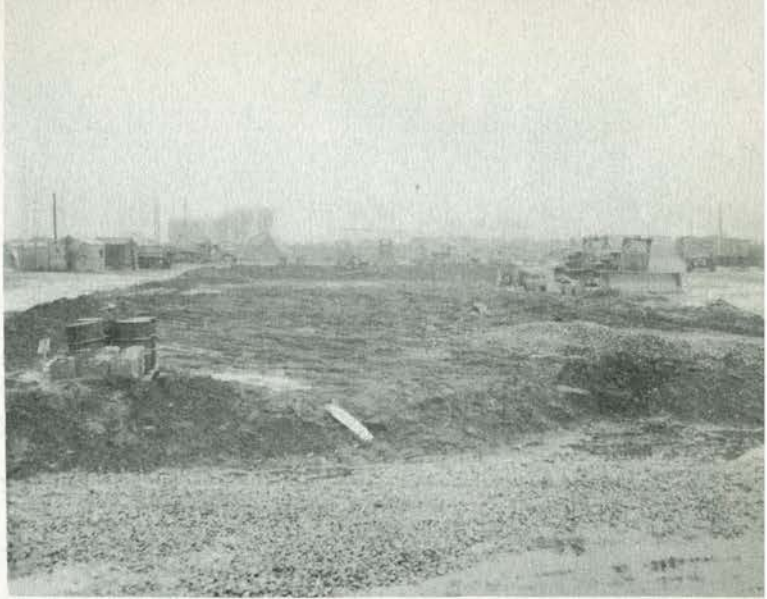
Some Romney type huts we built

master Base Depot. Rock quarries at Montfort and Poulseur were taken over and operated by the unit.

Constant liaison between the unit and manufacturers of hutting and shippers of cement and construction equipment was maintained. Clearance was secured to operate and control a fleet of civilian barges to be used to implement existing railway shipping facilities. Con-



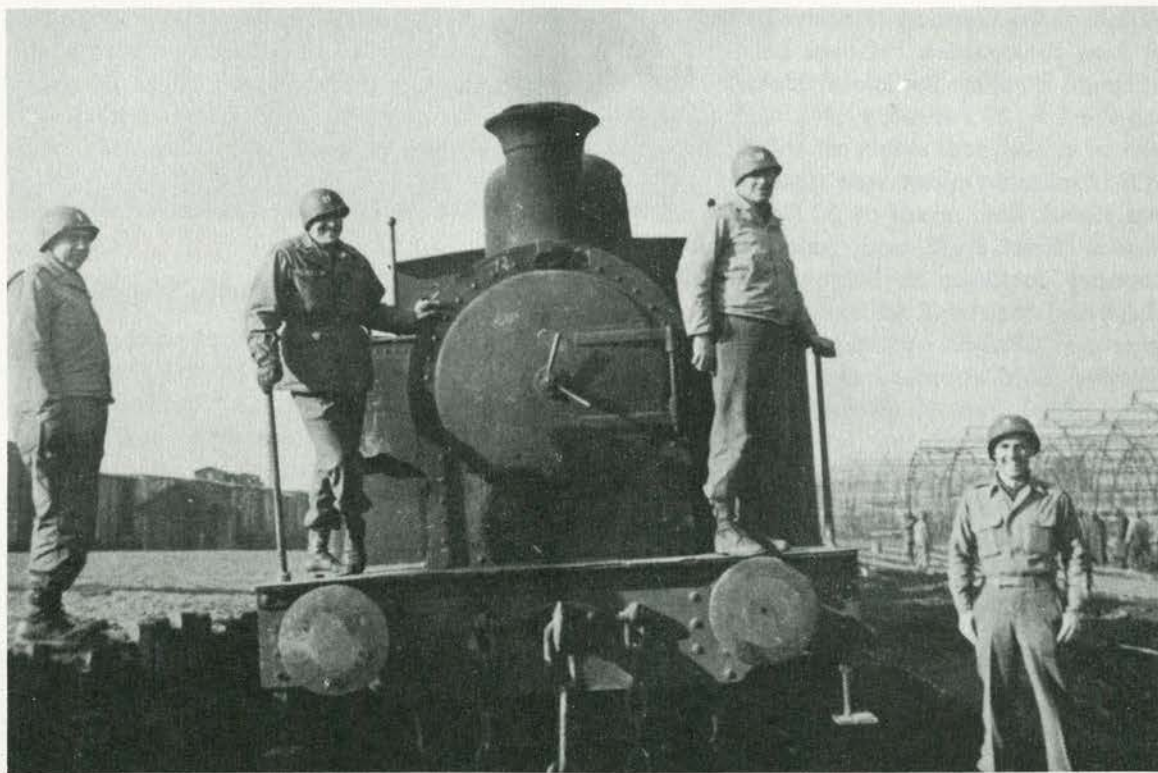

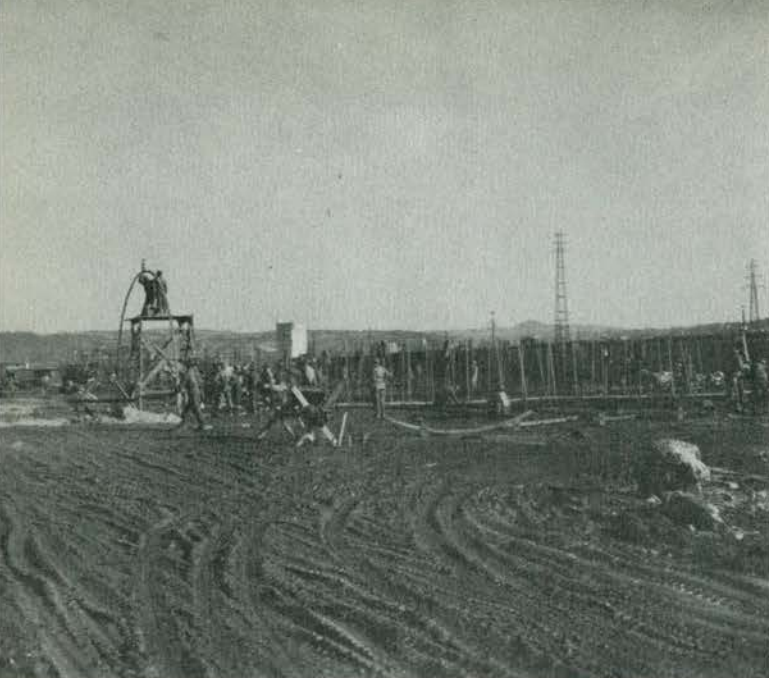

struction during the month of January fell behind the estimated amount, but increased rapidly during February, reaching a peak in this month, and continued until 10 March 1945.

During the latter part of February 1945, the counter-poised portions of the First, Third and Ninth Armies foretold a need for railroad rehabilitation, and the unit was warned by Advance Section that

it would again become a member of a railroad construction group in the early part of March 1945. Completion of all projects was expedited, completion dates were altered, and preparation was made for the transfer of continuing of the projects to the 374th Engineer General Service Regiment. During the period the unit was assigned to Engineer Group B, excepting the projects completed during the period of the German offensive, additional road construction between barge slips at Depot E-514 on the Isle of Monsin, during the 8 to 17 February 1945, rehabilitation of a railroad siding at the Sclessin POL decanting plant was assigned and completed. Roof repair at TC Depot T-705, Signal Depot S-892 and installations of Laundry facilities in Leige was supervised and controlled utilizing Prisoners-of-War and Civilian contractors. This work entailed hard standing and roads at all installations and the procurement of approximately 65,000 yards of rock and gravel. As of 8 March 1945, completed constructions at the 58th Quartermaster Base Depot, included the construction of 6 miles of railroads, sorting yards, leveling of sorting areas, installations of eighty-three (83) thirty-five (35) feet by ninety-six feet (35' x 96') concrete floors, internal lighting, semi-romney huts, approximately 5 miles of out-door lighting, road net-work and three (3) miles of

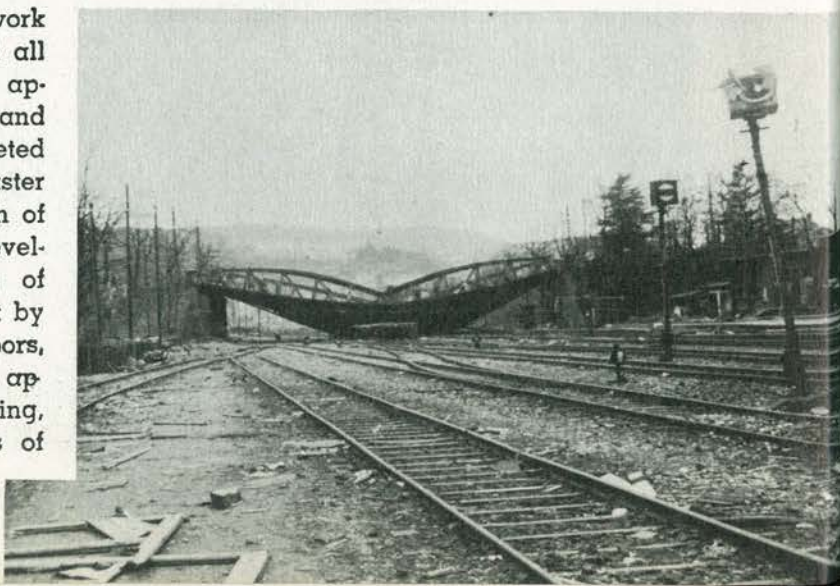
drainage ditches for the area. A total of 485,000 gross man hours were expended on all projects contributing to the construction of the assignment pertaining to the 58th Quartermaster Base Depot.

The Second Battalion was relieved effective 25 February 1945, and assigned to Advance Section Engineer Group B, and elements of the Battalion began movement to assignments issued by that Headquarters. The Regiment was relieved and assigned to Group B, effective 5 March 1945, by Advance Section Engineer Operations. The movement of the unit was accomplished during the period of 26 February to 8 March 1945, utilizing shuttle transportation and rail movement.

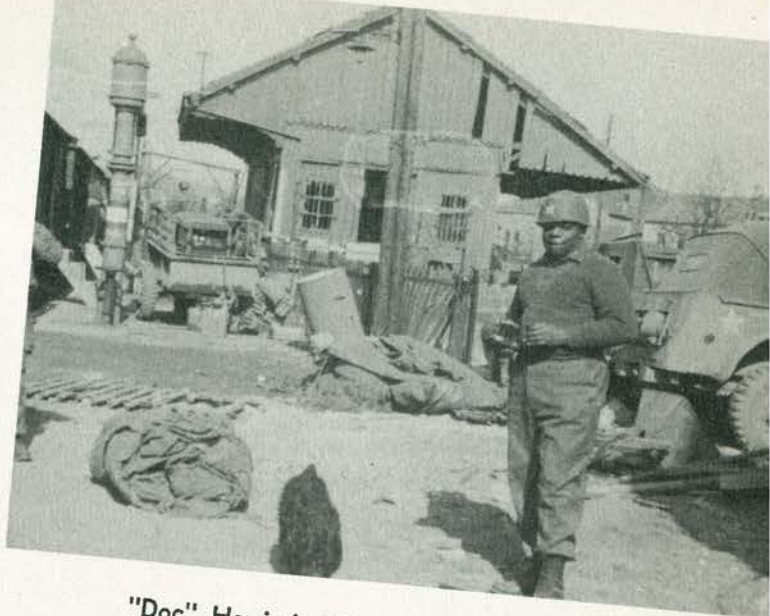
Railroad rehabilitation assignments received prior and during the movement enabled the companies to move directly to their prospective work sites. By 9 March 1945, advance elements of the unit were disposed of as follows: Regimental Headquarters and Headquarters and Service Company were located at Oetrage, Luxembourg, the First Battalion (less Company A) at Wasserbillig, Germany, Company A at Wellen, Germany.

Project R-199 was the initial assignment given to the unit, requiring rehabilitation of trackage from Sierk, Nittel-Konz, work on this line was commenced by leading elements of the Second Battalion

and Company A, on 2 March 1945, and was continued until the Third Army reached the Rhine River. The railway line from Wasserbillig, Luxemburg, to Ehrang, Germany, was repaired by the First Battalion, during the Moselle Campaign, and included the rehabilitation of the yards in Ehrang and Trier West. Company A returned to the First Battalion for assignment. Reduction of the Moselle pocket by the Third Army, during the first two weeks of March, permitted the repair and rehabilitation of more desirable roads from Thionville and Mainz to Saarbrücken on the Rhine and although reconnaissances

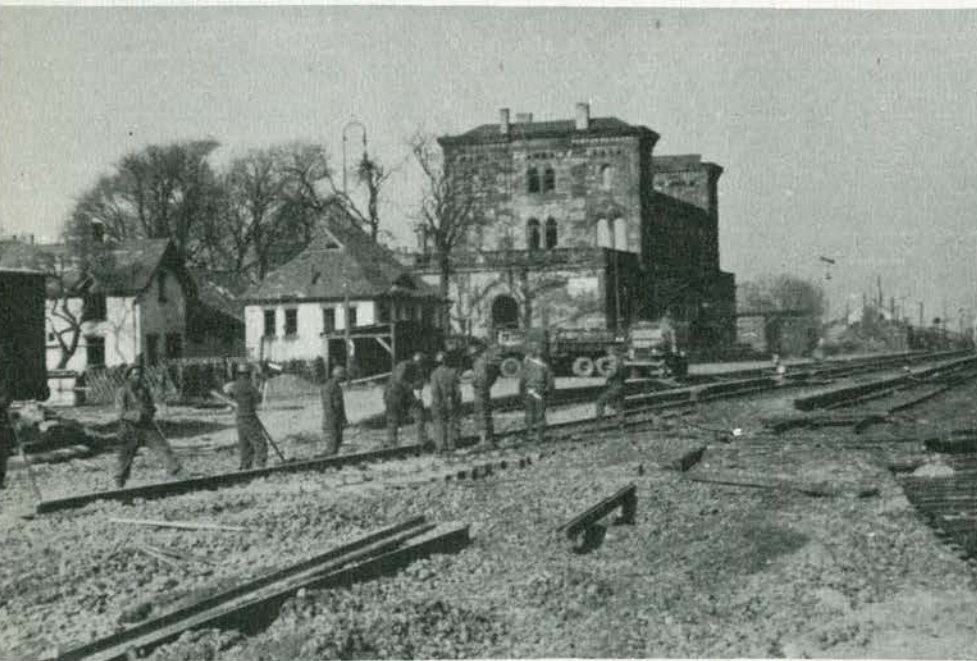
of the road Trier-Puderich via Bernkastel had been undertaken, and work on the line Ehrang-Trier-Gerolstein-Sinzig leading to the Rhine had been ordered all work on these lines was suspended, and the unit moved to assignment on rail lines Saarbrücken - Homburg - Odernheim - Bad Kreuznach - Mainz. On 23 to 28 March 1945, the Sector Saarbrücken - Homburg was controlled by Companies D and E, the sector Homburg - Odernheim by Companies A, C, and F, the Sector Odernheim-Mainz by Companies A and C. Rehabilitation of double track facilities through the Mainz railhead, from the North to the

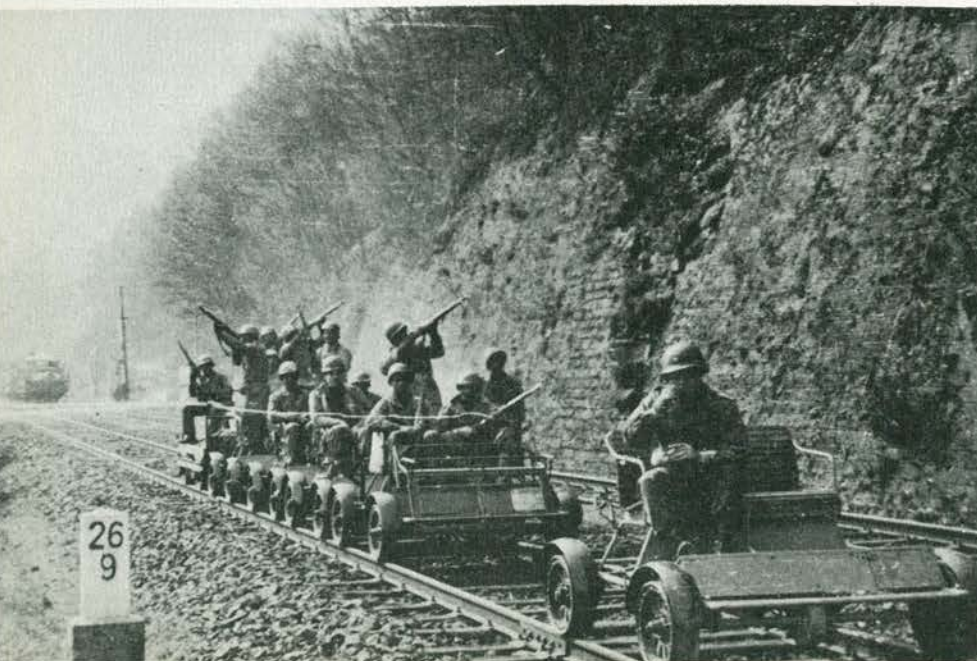

South was begun on the 29 March 1945, and engaged upon by all elements of the Regiment, which was then in the process of completing all assignments from Mainz to Saarbrücken and consolidating in Mainz preparatory to completion of railway facilities across the Rhine River. The work completed by the unit during the period of rehabilitation in the Moselle sector included double track lines, restoration of switch-points and cross-over-siding facilities and the initial reconnaissance of all lines and branch lines and water facilities encountered. This was Standing Operating Procedure on all railroad rehabilitation. To expedite the work during this phase, Regimental Headquarters was organized into two (2) sections, Advance Headquarters, to expedite operations and a base Headquarters to continue normal functions.

During the period of 4 April 1945 to 15 April 1945, the unit assisted in the construction of one of the largest war-time railroad bridges over the Rhine River at Mainz, Germany. During this period, however, elements of the First Battalion crossed the Rhine River by motor transport for the rehabilitation the Main River Bridge at Hanau. Reconnaissances and rehabilitation during this period were made on the line Hanau - Erfurt - Kassel - Leipzig, as the tactical situation in this area permitted. Following the completion of the Rhine River Bridge, dedicated as the Franklin Delano Roosevelt Bridge, on

14 April 1945, the Unit Headquarters train moved to Hanau. The remainder of the unit had previously moved across the Rhine River by motor transport during the period 6 and 8 April 1945 to engage in the rehabilitation of the rail line Frankfurt - Hanau - Fulda - Bebra - Erfurt. Units continually leap-frogged each other during phase of the work to speedily rehabilitate the ever increasing railway supply lines of the Third Army, which was knifing its way to Leipzig. Assignments on the line Weissenfels - Leipzig, Leingfelds to Gotha, Hersfeld to Gotha, and Hersfeld to Treysa were commenced during the period 20 to 22 April 1945. Work was suspended upon these lines on the 23 April 1945, prior to its completion, as the tactical situation of the First and Ninth Army front had altered. The Third Army altered its direction of attack and swung South toward Linz and Prague in order to halve the German forces and cut off the immediate possible movement to the Barvarian mountains in the so-called, "German National Redout Area." Sufficient forces were left behind to complete the rail line from Bebra to Erfurt, including the Erfurt yards. The balance of the Regiment moved by motor transport and railway to the vicinity of Nuremberg. Ground reconnaissance was initiated on the line Nurnberg - Augsburg - Munich, Wurtzburg - Treuchtlingen - Ingolstadt - Munich - Nurnburg - Regensburg. Large

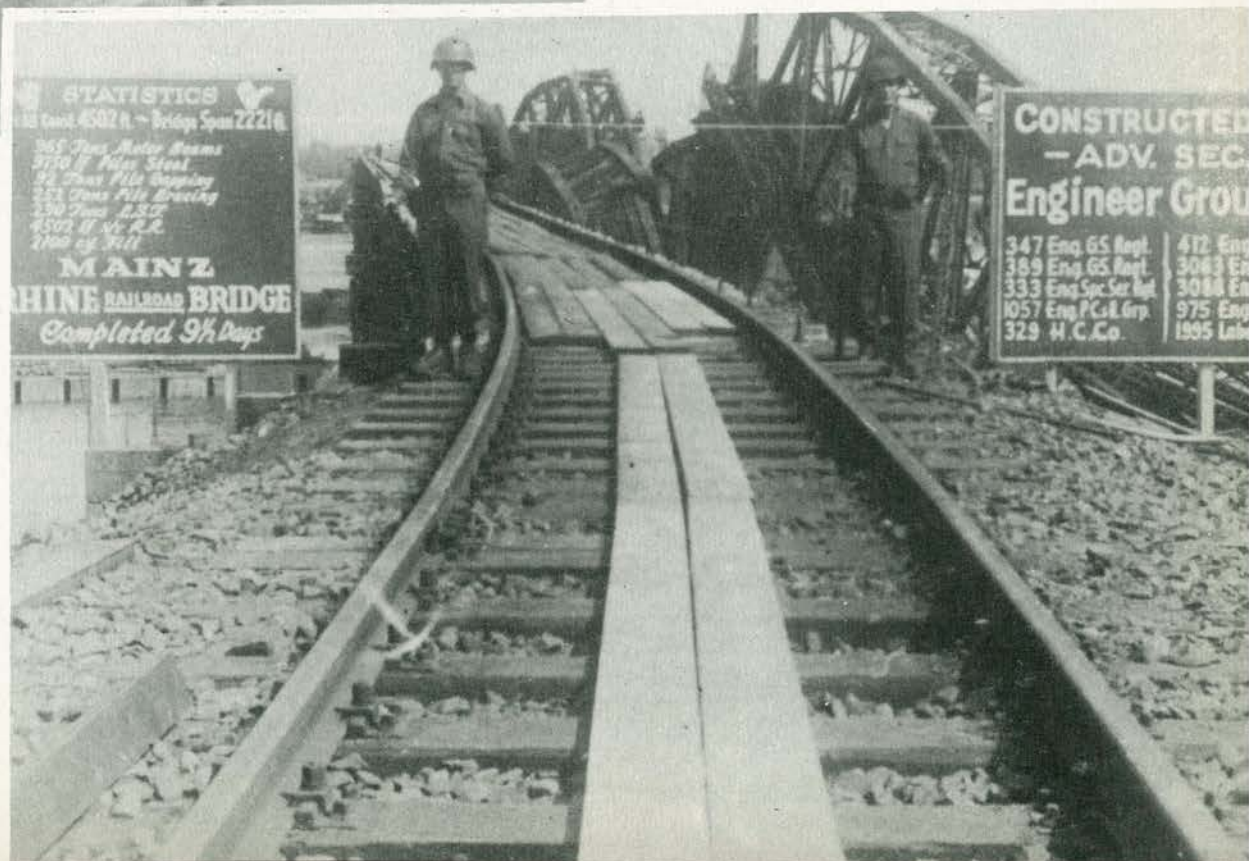

amounts of work was required in the Nurnburg yards. All troops engaged in this, until the tactical situation permitted their redeployment along the line Nurnburg - Augsburg - Munich. Work continued on this line until the cessation of hostilities on 7 May 1945. Final disposition of the unit at this time was as follows:

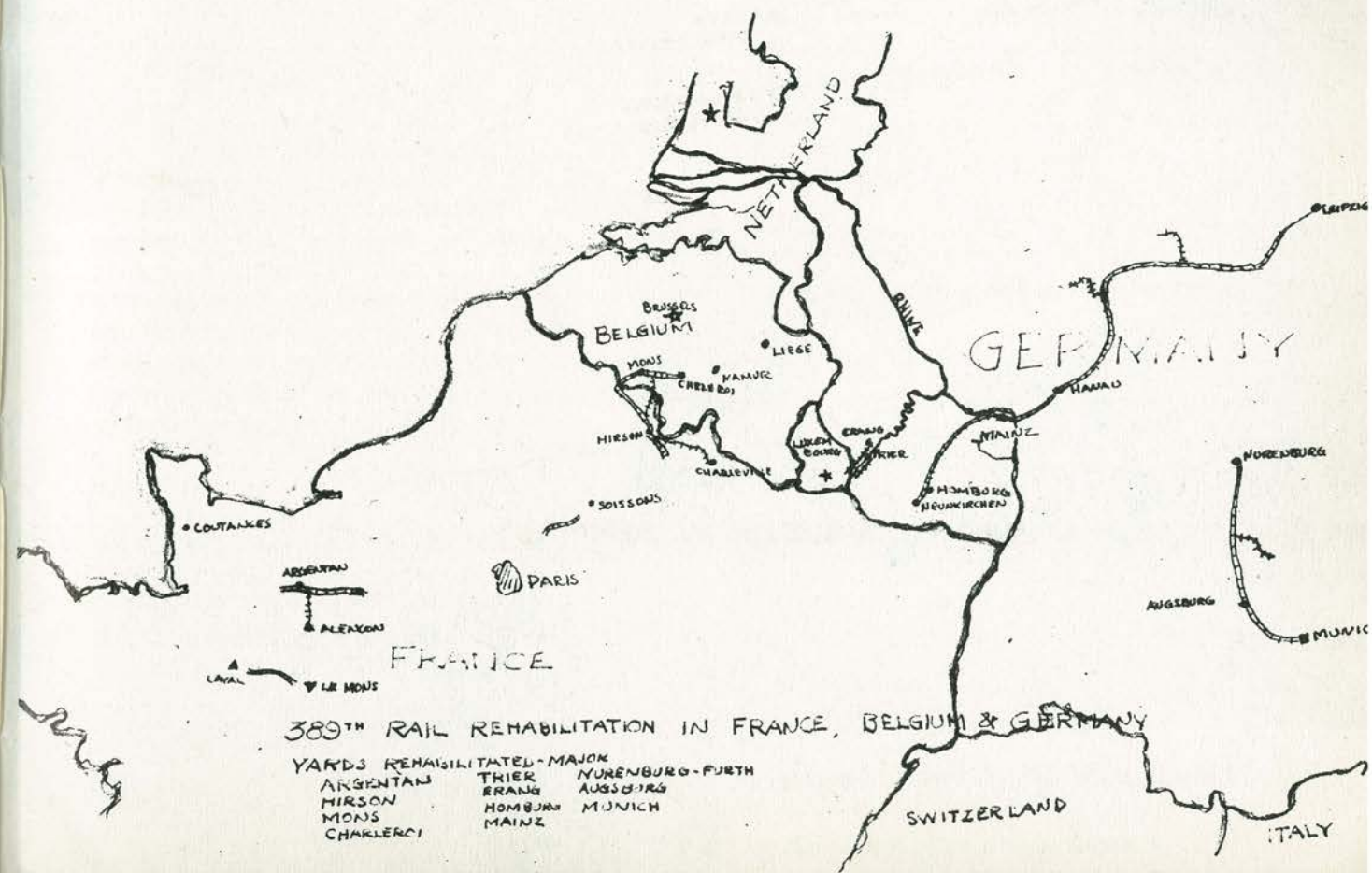

The unit continued rehabilitation of assigned projects until receipt of orders directing the unit to consolidate and move to their assignment with Oise Intermediate Base Section, Communications Zone, so as to arrive prior to 20 May 1945. The First Battalion was assigned to complete Camp San Antonio and move to that site. The Second Battalion was assigned to complete Camp Norfolk and moved to an old French camp near Sommesous, France. 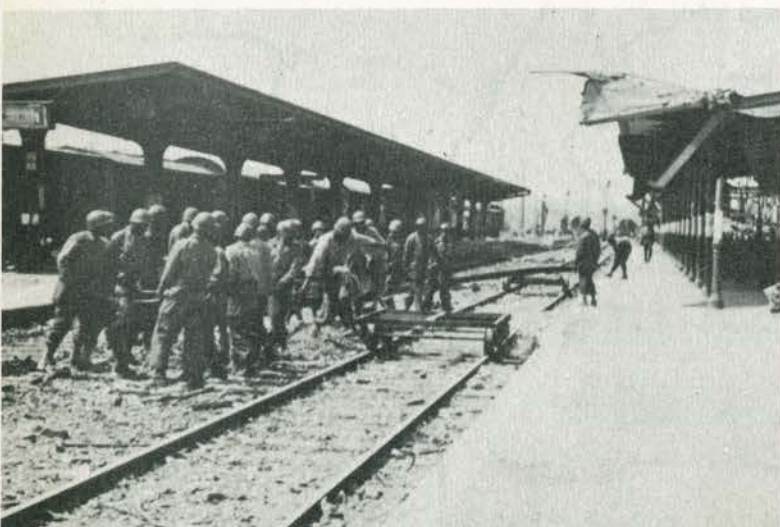

We never forget Sommesous but our stay there was all too short, for we soon found out that we were to go to Marseilles, France for some purpose. It was called "Redeployment Direct."

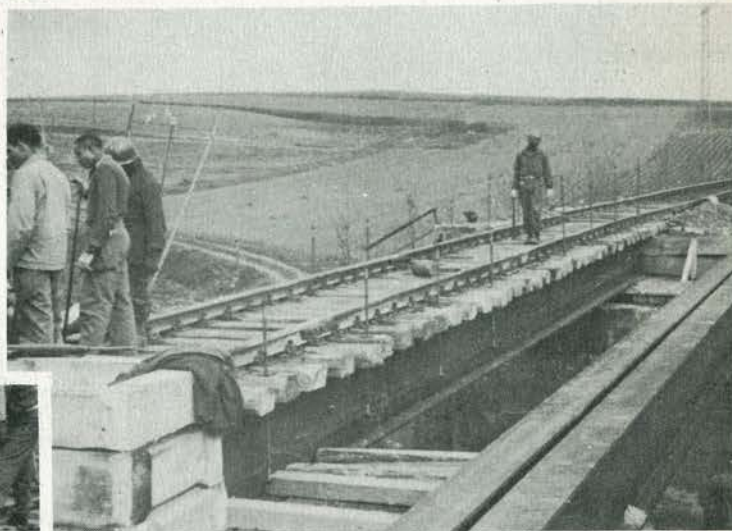

We can never forget dust, dust, dust, for we had it from morning to night to morning. We worked very hard or did



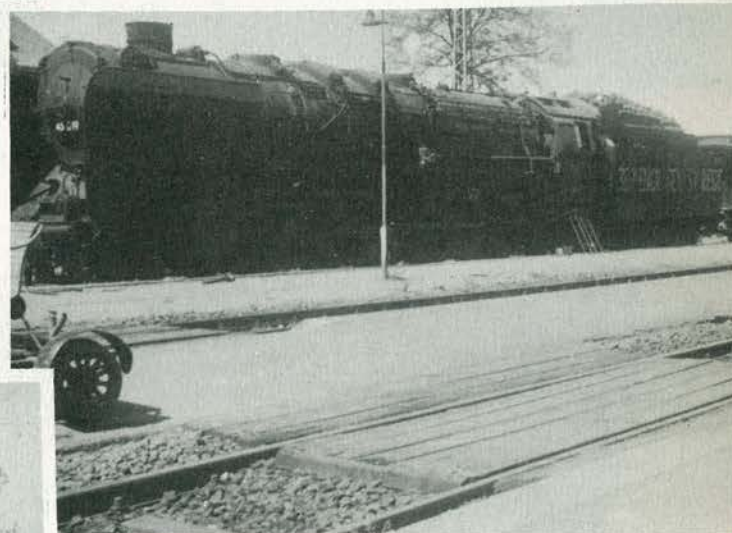

we? Well anyway we were getting ready to go to the Pacific, so we were told, and like good soldiers we accepted our fate, but still hoping something would happen.

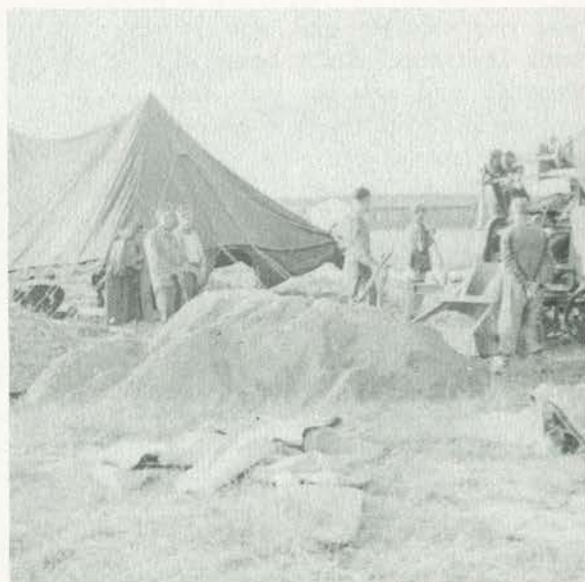

which were O.K. for then we were away with "beaucoup cognac et Mademoiselles," the latter not without attending troubles, for the medics had conferences with us at times.

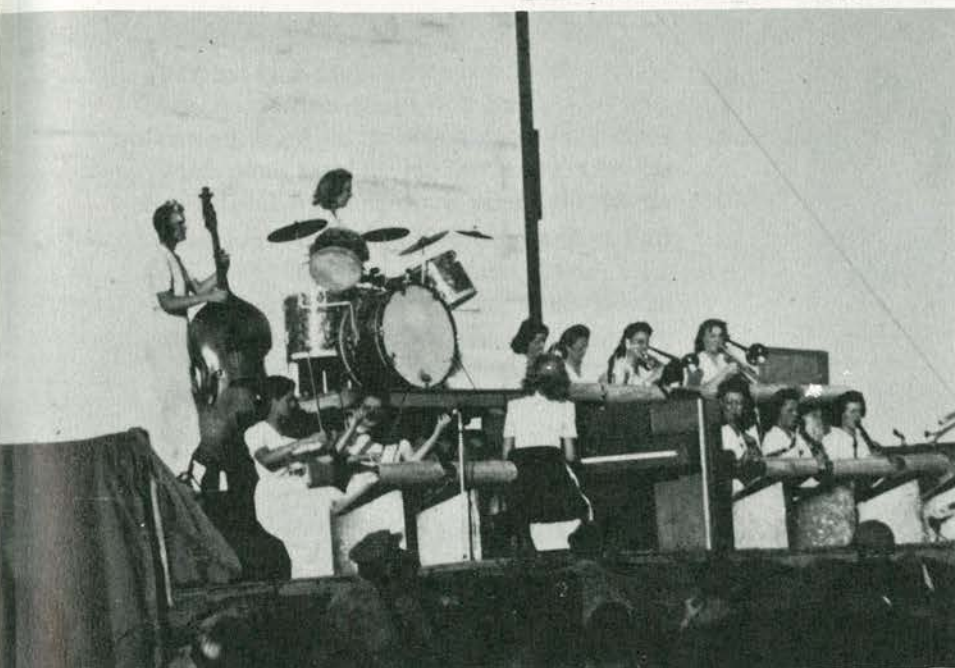

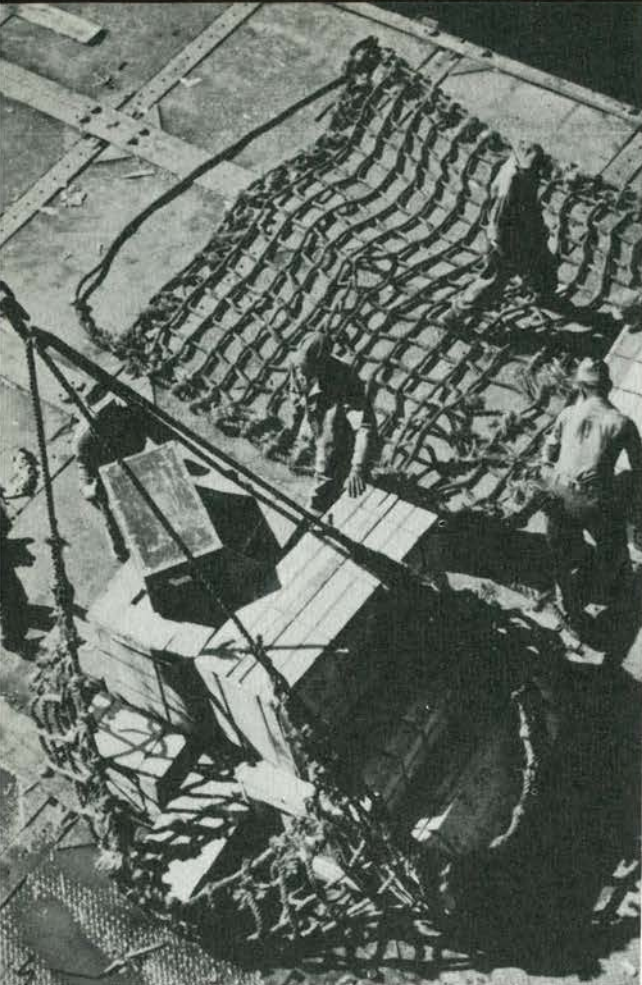

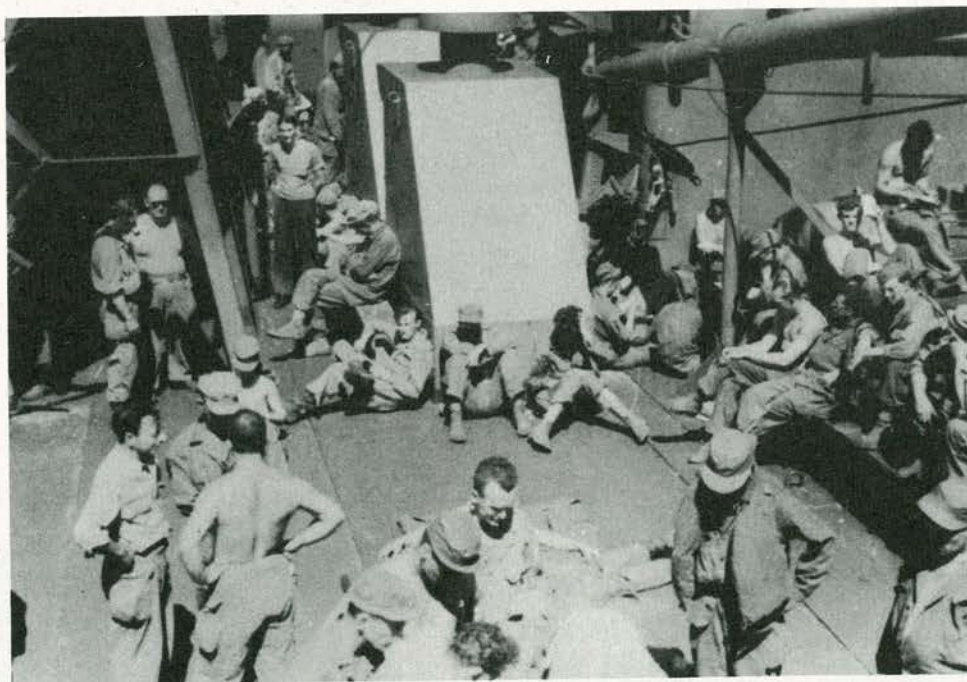

world is again ready to build anew on the principles of the four freedoms: Freedom from fear, freedom from want, freedom from hunger, and freedom from force. So

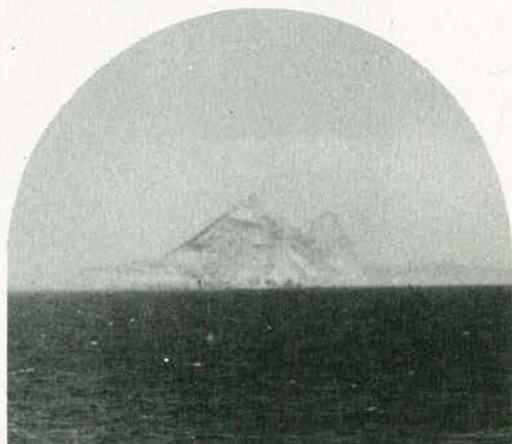
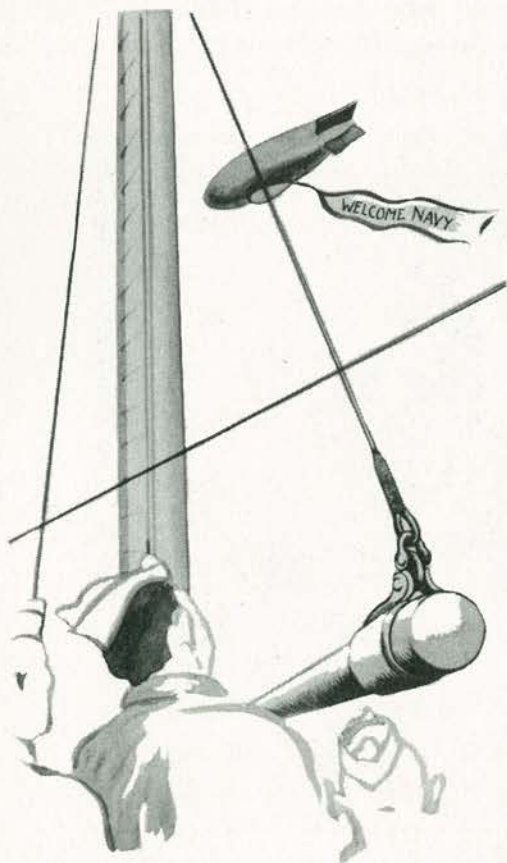
